MYRTLE CREEK HIGH SCHOOL NEWS ITEMS.

One of these cars had a blow-out, which they were forced to stop and repair. The group arrived in Roseburg about five o'clock, just in time to see the finish of the game. Roseburg was unable to secure a ball, so Myrtle Creek's ball was patched and used; two players were also loaned to Roseburg for a game. As the game was extremely wet and muddy, the sides could develop but little work. Myrtle Creek lost a game to secure an easy goal. Again, the score was just in sight, when the ball burst. The boys all went home

whistling, "The End of a Perfect Day." There will be another game with Roseburg on the Myrtle Creek field Saturday, December 18, as both teams have secured new balls. In that game the Myrtle Creek boys hope to appear in new suits for the first time.

Eva Ackert, one of our seniors, is at present ill with typhoid fever. The Myrtle Creek High School intends to give a play in the near future. The one selected is, "You Never Can Tell." The parts will be assigned immediately and rehearsals begun. It is hoped the play may be given the latter part of January. The money obtained from this is to augment our annual fund.

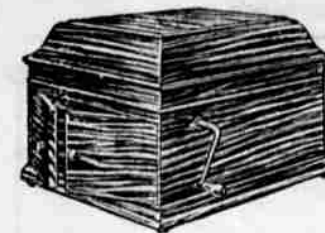
Visiting in City—
