JUNEAU, Alaska, Dec. 10.—Governor Thomas Riggs, Jr., of Alaska, has announced that his resignation will be in the hands of President-elect Harding March 4.

Mr. Riggs was appointed governor of Alaska by President Wilson in 1916. He was associated actively with Alaska enterprises for several years before his appointment.
