Disabled May Get Their Checks Early

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 10.—In response to the request of national officers of the American Legion a special effort is being made by the Bureau of War Risk Insurance to see that every ex-service man entitled to compensation during December gets his check before the fifteenth of the month, in order that he may have it for Christmas.

The War Risk Bureau officials have announced that they have succeeded in so perfecting their machinery of operation that the long delays hitherto attending the sending out of checks to the 210,000 disabled ex-service men drawing a monthly compensation, will in the future be done away with.
