Own Your Home Campaign to Start

NEW YORK, Dec. 16—National Thrift eek committees, with the co-operation of the Savings Division of the United States Treasury Department, and thirty seven other organizations, will sponsor "own your own home" exhibitions in many large cities throughout the country during the week of January 17 to 23 next, to aid in solving the housing problem, according to announcement as made today by Adolph Lewishon, the chairman.

The American Institute of Architects has approved a national competition with prizes ranging from \$15,000 for the best plans of small, economical, practical houses and bungalows. On Thursday, January 21, "own your own home day" of the fourth national thrift week, a concentrated effort will be made to urge men of small means and foreign born to own and build homes as a practical Americanization feature of the program.

New York and Chicago will conduct a "own your own home" exhibition later on a large scale. The Chicago exposition will be held on March 26 to April 2, and that of New York on April 16 to 30.

Luncheon Dishes

Simple and Delicious Recipes
Compiled for Benefit of Many
Housekeepers in Douglas County.

(Note—The following recipes have been compiled by Miss Emma Ueland, instructor of the Domestic science department of the Roseburg high school.)

Potatoes Au Gratin

6 cold cooked potatoes cut in dice; 1 cup grated cheese; salt and pepper; 1 pt. hot milk; 2 T butter; 4 T flour.

Rub butter and flour smooth and add to the scalded milk. When it is thickened, season; then place a layer of potatoes in a baking pan, cover with the milk mixture, and repeat with the potatoes. Continue until the dish is filled with alternate layers. White sauce on top. Bake 20 minutes.

Escalloped Potatoes with Cheese.

Slice 2 C raw potatoes very thin; roll 1 C crackers; grate 1 C cheese. Place alternate layers in baking dish with pieces of butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Pour over all milk 2-3 dish. Bake one hour.

Scalloped Macaroni, Tomato Sauce.

2 C juice and pulp of tomatoes pressed through colander; 2 T C butter; 2 T flour; 1 t salt; 2 C of cooked macaroni. Cook macaroni in double boiler by pouring boiled salted water over it all and cook until tender. Combine remaining ingredients except the cracker crumbs as for white sauce. When macaroni is done, fill buttered dish with alternate layers of the macaroni and tomato sauce. Cover with buttered cracker crumbs and grown in oven.

Scalloped Onions.

Put onions in cold water and remove skins under water. Drain, cut in quarters, put in sauce pan and cover with boiling salted water. Boil 15 minutes, drain and again cover with boiling water to cook until tender, but not broken. Drain, add 1/2 C one to two white sauce, and put in buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with buttered cracker crumbs and place on grate in the oven to brown.

Cocoa—1 cup.

1 C milk; 3-4 T cocoa; 1 T sugar. Scald milk in double boiler. Mix sugar and cocoa; add enough hot water to form paste. Cook until smooth. Add to scalded milk and cook a few minutes longer. Beat with egg beater and serve.

Oatmeal Mold with Fish and Eggs.

Pour left over well cooked oatmeal or rolled oats into a fireproof dish. When cold, scoop out the center, and leave a wall 1/2 inch thick. Fill the space with creamed fish and chopped hard-cooked whites of eggs. Place in oven until thoroughly hot. Serve garnished with yelks of eggs rubbed through a sieve and pieces of lemon.

Veal Balls, Tomato Sauce.

1 1/2 lbs neck of veal; 1 C dry bread crumbs; 2 t grated onion; 1-4 t nutmeg; 1-4 lb salt pork or bacon; 2 t salt; 1 t Worcestershire sauce; 1 t poultry seasoning. Put the raw meat and pork thru food chopper; add the bread crumbs and seasoning; mix well and roll in eight balls, brown quickly in hot were serving dish. Cover with strained drippings or oil. Place in earthenware tomato sauce and bake 45 minutes. Serve in the casserole.

Meat Pie.

1 1/2 C meat cut in 1/2 inch cubes; 1/2 C liquor from meat broth; 3-4 T flour; salt. Shake sauce of liquor, by heating it in a sauce pan and adding flour which has been mixed with a little cold water. Cook until thick. Salt to taste. Add to meat and put mixture in baking dishes. Spread layer of pie dough on top and bake about 15 minutes in hot oven.

Macaroni and Cheese.

2-4 C broken macaroni; 2 qt boiling water; 1 T salt; 1-4 to 1-2 C of grated cheese; buttered bread crumb. Boil the macaroni in water 20 minutes, or until soft, and when nearly

cooked add salt; drain in strainer; rinse with cold water; put in layer C macaroni in buttered baking dish, all the macaroni and cheese last; sprinkle with cheese. Repeat until been used; pour white sauce over the top, cover with buttered bread crumbs, and bake until brown.

A Tomato Rarebit.

Mix together 1 lb grate cheese; 1/2 pt strained tomatoes; 1 t salt; dash of cayenne; 1 C soft bread crumbs. Rub saucepan with garlic or a slice of onion, turn in the mixture and stir until hot and smooth. Serve at once on buttered toast.

Mexican Rice.

Wash 1/2 C rice and let dry; chop fine 2 T of onion and 2 peppers, 2 or 2 1/2 inches long; put in skillet 1 T of butter or bacon grease; let smoke but not burn; add rice and stir constantly until delicate brown remove from stove add onion and pepper, stir, pour into this 1-4 C of hot water and add salt to taste. Cook rapidly without stirring or covering 25 to 30 minutes.

Creamed Cheese on Toast.

1 C white sauce; 2-3 C cheese; Toast. Make white sauce and add the cheese until it melts. Serve on the buttered toast.

Blushing Bunny.

1 lb cheese; 1 can Campbell's tomato soup; 1 egg; 2 or 3 green peppers; seasoning to taste. To one can tomato soup add 1 lb cheese and stir it until it melts. Add the egg and stir again. Season to taste and serve on wafers.

English Monkey.

1 C bread crumbs; 1 C milk; 1 T butter; 1/2 C cheese; 1 egg; salt. Soak bread crumbs in milk, heat an egg and butter and cheese stirring until melted. Stir in egg, salt and pepper to taste. Pour over salted crackers.

Dough for Meat Pie.

1/2 C flour; 1 1/2 t baking powder; 1-4 T lard; 1-4 T butter; 2-4 T milk.

Mix and sift the dry ingredients. Work in butter and lard with knives and add milk gradually form a soft dough, mixing it with a knife. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness.

Creamed Ham

1 C boiled ham chopped fine; 1 pt cream or rich milk; 2 eggs; Toast. Cook together ham and cream. As soon as hot, add eggs, well beaten, stir constantly one minute, season and serve on toast.

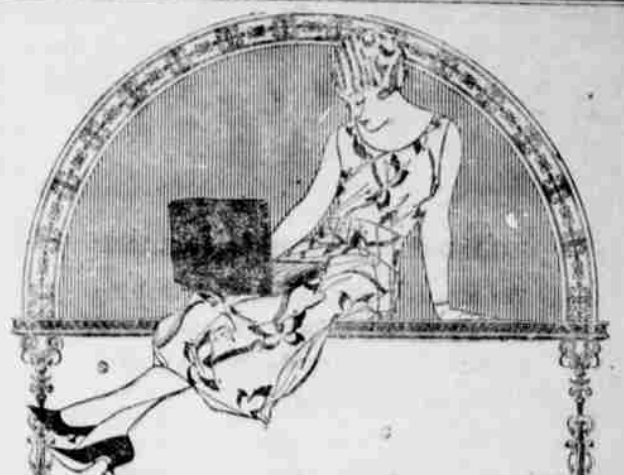
