Practically 4,000 Turks Shipped Sat.

Turkey buyers in Roseburg secured about two thousand 17½ lb. on Saturday, according to statements made today. The farmer's pool here and at Oakland consisted of about 1300 turkeys. The price paid by local and outside buyers on Saturday did not exceed 45 cents and there was very little competition in buying. The lack of competition was caused by the formation of the pool according to the buyers. It is not known just what price the growers will receive for the turkeys which were pooled. They will be shipped at once to San Francisco, and County Agent Hapsett will have charge of their sale. The farmers expect a few cents in excess of the local buying price, however, and those who had charge of the formation of the pool were much satisfied with the results. Most of the birds brought in were in first class condition and few culls were placed on the market.

War Prisoners Thank Americans

BUDAPEST.—Eighteen hundred Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war in East Siberia thank American officers of the 27th Infantry, part of the American expeditionary force which served there, for their lives, health and what happiness a prison camp can give. Their spokesman, Lieutenant Colonel Ferdinand Reder, formerly of the Austro-Hungarian army, told the Associated Press correspondent he felt it his duty, upon arriving here after six years in the prison camp of Krasnaja Bljotschka, near Krabarovsk, to tell of the American aid.

"We owe our lives to the American officers of the 27th Infantry Regiment, to Colonel C. H. Morrow, Captain E. Larkins, Surgeon Burdett and Lieutenant John James," said Colonel Reder.

"Influenza broke out in our camp in October, 1918. The physical condition of the prisoners was at that time so reduced that the disease spread with frightful rapidity. Hardly anyone was spared and there soon were 800 serious cases. No medicines were available. The shortage of food was more and more terrible and we were all convinced our camp would soon be one vast cemetery without a living soul to tell the sad tale.

"At this horrible pass, when we were all a prey to despair, Colonel Morrow and E. company of the 27th Infantry Regiment, under the command of Captain Larkin, arrived and took charge of our camp. The Americans brought provisions for a month and soon our miserable hospital was transformed into a model establishment and the epidemic was quelled.

"Colonel Morrow then set about making our lives worth living. Workshops of all sorts were arranged, schools opened, a library, a theater, baths and a coffee house were built, and grounds for every kind of sport were laid out.

"After all those weary years, we felt raised to the dignity of manhood again. And now should like all the world to know, that we owe our lives, our health and happiness, our power for good in this world, to the noble American officers of the 27th Regiment, to the great American nation."

Parents are warned to keep children away from candles that may be used as decorations. Oftentimes the children's clothes are ignited while they are romping around, and knock off candles or set fire to the Christmas tree with grave results.

Another prolific cause of fire comes from amateur electric wiring. If any wiring is to be done it should be done by a professional, as imperfect electrical connections do a great deal of damage.

Fires are also frequently caused by wrapping flammable or crepe paper around electric light globes. This is more common in decorating store windows or at parties and socials. Mr. Fletcher states, and a little carelessness in this regard may result in the loss of valuable property and possibly the loss of lives.
