Movie Closeups

In "A Girl named Mary," the picture in which Marguerit Clark is starring at the Antlers theatre for the last time tonight, the traditionally impossible task of locating a needle in a haystack is successfully accomplished. Not literally, of course but when a lonely mother searches throughout the country for her missing daughter for fifteen years and then has her walk in the house one day amounts to about the same thing.

Search of a wealthy widow, Mrs. Jaffrey, for her daughter who has been missing since the railroad wreck in which Mr. Jaffrey is killed. In the course of the search she becomes acquainted with a vivacious young girl, named Mary Healy, the role as played by Miss Clark.

Later it develops that Mary, who lives quite plainly with a foster mother, and is loved by a youth named Henry Martin, is the missing girl. Mrs. Jaffrey is overjoyed at the discovery, but her attempts to inject the girl into a luxurious environment are at first failures. When the widow at last sees the light and consents to Mary's marriage to Henry, the happy ending is in sight.

Kathlyn Williams in the part of the widow, heads the supporting cast. The picture is a Paramount-Artcraft and was directed by Walter Edwards.

Heralded as the best feature in which William Russell has starred, "The Man Who Dared," a new William Fox Production with the story laid in the giant redwoods of California, is playing at the Liberty theatre for the last time tonight.

William Russell has the role of Big Jim O'Kane, the boss of the timberjack camp. The story, which is by Julius G. But the chief interest is the story. The central figure is the brutal sea captain, "Wolf." Wolf is a peculiar mixture of villain and hero, philosopher and near-animal. The plot centers around this terror of the deep and the adventures that befall a beautiful girl and her young idler admirer, when they are involved in a collision and, rescued by Larsen, are kept aboard his vessel.

Noah Berry gives a remarkable performance as "Wolf." Tom Forman is the rescued youth who becomes a cabin boy; and Mabel Julien Scott is the rescued girl. Walter Long, Raymond Hatton, Eddie Sullivan, James Gordon and Fred Huntley also are in the cast. The picture is a George Melford Production.
