LEGION TO HAVE NEW ANNEX.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 20.—Portland post, American Legion, is to have a "sunshine" degree. This sunshine annex to the legion is named La Societe Nationale Des 40 Hommes et 8 Chevaux.

The name is from the famous legend that adorned all French railway sidings during the world war.

Twenty names have been signed to the charter roll for the Portland "box car" which will be established next week. A charter has been applied for and is expected to arrive from the national terminal yards at Pittsburg, Pa., within a few days.

The society was organized to add play features to the meetings of the American Legion. It will be to that veterans' association what the Mystic Shrine is to Scottish Rite and Knights Templar Masons.

Navy Airplanes to Attempt Big Trip

(By Associated Press).—Some twenty six big navy airplanes will roar their way out of San Diego harbor, bound for Panama, 3,000 miles away, in what veteran airmen say will be one of the longest and most hazardous peace time flights in the history of aviation, according to the plans announced here recently. The fleet is to leave early on the morning of December 28.

About 50 flying hours are expected to reach the first goal at Balboa, located in the canal zone. The machines are scheduled to arrive at Balboa January 13, and to start on the return flight February 26.

Storms probably will be encountered by the airmen along the Mexican and Central American coast, as this is the stormy season along the route. One dangerous place is in the Gulf of Tehuantepec, where high and dangerous winds blow almost continually. Air service officials are taking every precaution to cope with any situation that may arise as the result of storms, high winds and fog.

Fourteen seaplanes of the N. C. type, which made the navy's flight across the Atlantic Ocean will be in the Panama squadron. The other 12 will be of the coastal type of plane.

Captain Henry Mustin, commander of the Pacific air forces will have charge of the squadron of seaplanes and Commander John H. Towers, who led the Atlantic squadron will command the N. C. squadron.

Seven naval vessels will follow the airplanes as patrols and tenders. They will be the fuel vessels, the Kanawha and Cuyama; the aircraft tenders, Arcostook and Mugford, and the mine sweepers, Gannett, Partridge and Kingfisher.

Want to Amend Fishing Laws

Senator B. L. Eddy is in receipt of a communication from the Reedsport Fishermen's Union, concerning legislation on the fishing laws which is to come up at the next session of the legislature. The Union is enlisting the aid of all the members of the Douglas County delegation in obtaining these changes. The Union wants the spring open season on the lower Umpqua extended fifteen days. The season now closes on April 15th and under the new law would remain open until May first. They also want the season reopened in the fall on December 20th, instead of January 10. Another section of the law provides for a special tax to be levied of one-quarter of a cent per pound on all salmon caught, the proceeds to go for the propagation of the salmon.

A committee of local business men yesterday canvassed the business section of the city in regard to the Herbert Hoover drive for the children of Europe, and according to B. L. Eddy, the chairman of the drive, the committee met with a ready response in every case.
