BRATTEN MAKES RECORD.

LONG BEACH, Cal., Dec. 25.—Flying at a speed of 146.8 miles an hour, Lieutenant E. E. Bratten, U. S. A., aviator, won the 100-mile free-for-all race for the Albert H. Hays challenge trophy, the opening event today of the three-day National Winter Air tournament at Daugherty Field here. Thirteen flyers started in the race, twelve being army men, and eleven finished.

Lieutenant Bratten's time for the 100 miles, flown over a triangular course, was 46 minutes, 52 seconds.

PRINEVILLE, Dec. 27.—The Crook County State bank here failed to open today. Shrinkage in value of cattle and sheep, on which the bank had made loans, is said to be responsible. The bank is not a member of the federal reserve system. They have sixty days to reorganize.

Freight Wreck Near West Fork

A freight wreck at West Fork just before noon today delayed train No. 14, due here from the south at 1:55, for several hours. A stub was sent out from this city at two o'clock, scheduled to go as far as Eugene. The freight was an extra east, with Conductor Hardman and Engineer Thomas. One car was derailed throwing two others off the track also. Two cars of oranges fell into Cow Creek River, one car of oranges and a car of oil alongside the track. The cause of the accident was not known at a late hour this afternoon. The local relief crew was sent out to repair the damage.
