PULLMAN, Wash., Doc. 28 .- The PULLMAN, Wash, Doc. 28.—The farm wife of Washington does 34 per cent of the outdoor work on the farm, 75 per cent of the housework, 25 per cent of the record-keeping, and in return receives 10 per cent of the money made on the farm, according to facts collected by Maude Wilson, state home demonstration leader of the Washington State college extension service. Following the farm wife's steps through one day during the aunmer would require fourteen hours of daily toil with slightly more than one hour of rest, Miss Wilson's findings showed. She is cook, seamstress, laundress, nurse, a factor in community life, and, in 26 per cent of the cases, bookkeeper. She works in the dairy, the garden and in the henyard. In the winter her work is not quite so heavy and her working day is only 12.27 hours, and she gets, on the average, 2.14 hours of rest.

## WOMEN PROMINENT NATIONAL AFFAIRS

Touch of Feminine Government is Being Felt Over Entire United States.

### SEVERAL TO CONGRESS

County Offices Being Filled: Missour Shows Greatest Liking For Female Sex and Nine Counties Select Women Officials.

CHICAGO, Dec. 27 Oklahomi with a Congresswoman in the 67th Congress, Kansas and Texas with women as State Saperintendents of Public Instruction, Missouri with 9 county treasurers out of thirteen women elected to county offices, and Michigan classics. and Michigan claiming two women sheriffs, take the leading places of distinction on the suffrage question in the Central West as the result of the recent nation wide election.

Women have entered nearly every field of public service, from juror and school trustee to member of the House if Representatives, and following last month's election. Miss Alice Robertson, of Muskogee, Okla, "past sixty" a successful restaurant propriteor, and, incidentally, an op-ponent of woman suffrage, will take her seat as the second woman ever sent to the national congress.

Missouri showed the greatest liking for women office holders, although are not eligible for state offices. Nine counties elected women as treasurers, three selected women as son is the wife of a Muncie news public administrators and one a re-paper man. order of deeds.

Ten women were elected to office Ten women were elected to office in Michigan, including one state senator, but perhaps the most uique selections were those of Mrs. Estella K. Gates and Mrs. J. Mrs. Johnson, who is 65 years old says she is confident she can arrest any "bad man" who violates the law in Roscommon county. She will appoint her husband as ty.
