Legion and Labor Have Same Interests

NEW YORK, Dec. 29—Closer relations between the American Legion and Organized Labor are promised as a result of letters exchanged between F. W. Gallbraith, Jr., National Commander of the Legion, and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Gallbraith's letter defined the purposes of the Legion and emphasized its neutrality in politics as a body, while in no way infringing on the personal freedom of its members. In reply Mr. Gompers explained that the effort of the A. F. of L. to make life brighter for its members and to encourage them to "perform the duties they owe to our country and our fellowmen."

Mr. Gompers said that he had aided members of trade unions to understand the Legion's purposes, and that on several occasions, resolutions

presented in labor meetings had been tabled or defeated because of information he had provided in relation to the work of the Legion. The National commander replied to this letter by saying that there was nothing in the declaration of the A. F. of L. to which the Legion could object, and that the Legion subscribes to every word of its sentiment.

Aged Yoncalla Resident Dies

Mrs. Sarah Ann Caldwell, a well known Yoncalla resident, passed away at her home at that place on Sunday, December 26, at the age of 93 years, two months and nine days.

Sarah A. McKinney was born in Franklin county, Missouri, October 17, 1827. She crossed the plains by ox team with her parents in company with Captain Joe Watts in 1848. She was married to Alexander Caldwell near Amity, Oregon, February 14, 1859. Five children were born to them, James, William and Frank, deceased, and Mary Dehlla and Stephen survive. There are also five grandchildren, George W. Caldwell, of Condon; Anna V. Caldwell, of Pendleton; Vernon Caldwell, of Yoncalla; Charles Caldwell, of Roseburg, and Sylvia A. Owen, of Los Angeles.

She joined the Christian church at an early age, and lived a long and devout Christian life, loved by all who knew her. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Morris, of Yoncalla. Mrs. Caldwell designated the scripture lesson the first twelve verses of Matthew, and the hymns, "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," that she wished to have used in her funeral service. She was buried at Yoncalla by the side of her two sons, James and Frank.
