WOOL MEN MAY MAKE OWN CLOTH

Plan on Foot to Send Virgin
Wool to Mills Where Cloth
Will be Made.

PLANS ARE DISCUSSED

Co-operative Marketing and Plans
For Livestock Shipments Are
Discussed by Leaders of the
Farm Bureau Projects.

The Farm Bureau office yesterday was the scene of two lively meetings that will have much to do with the future welfare of the agriculturist in Douglas county.

In the morning the community leaders in the poultry work, carried on under the direction of the county agent and the agricultural college met and discussed plans for carrying on the work asked for by the poultrymen of the county. As a result, their chairman, W. G. Burt and H. E. Haslett will plan for three poultry tours to be held next summer. At this time, the poultrymen will visit the poultry demonstration farms to learn new ways of doing things in the poultry business.

The afternoon session was taken up in discussing problems of marketing and buying. Mr. C. W. Groves was chosen chairman of the Marketing Committee of leaders and Mr. J. R. Howard chairman of the committee having charge of the buying work.

Plans for co-operative livestock shipping were discussed and suggested changes made. Wool grading, shipping and selling also came in for a share in the discussion. The committee recommended that a report be given at the annual meeting of the Sheep and Goat Breeders Association, Tuesday afternoon, January 4th, in regard to the making of the Douglas county wool and mohair into cloth.

The following facts in this connection are worth repeating, says Mr. Haslett.

"Strong Hewat & Co., the largest virgin wool manufacturers in America, are weaving into cloth a carload of Dakota wool shipped by the growers themselves. Anyhow, the Dakota shepherds will have some real clothing this winter. They are expecting to have the 'goods' soon."

"Wool growers in the Salt Lake country are considering favorably the proposition to ship virgin wool from that region and have the same made into cloth by an eastern mill. They will have the cloth returned, and made up into clothing."

"The boys and girls of New Haven county have sheared enough of wool from their own sheep to make 1,200 yards of 'virgin wool cloth' suitable for making clothes such as grandfather used to boast of on his way back from the woolen mills. The youngsters are realizing from 75 cents to \$1.00 per pound for the wool used in this way."

"For sixty days we have been besieged by growers who want to have their clips manufactured into blankets, yarn and cloth. The calls come from every section of the country, and as far south as California. Most of this sort of thing has been done by the small mills, but now the larger spinners are offering to help out the wool growers."

The Douglas county Farm Bureau agent started this movement in a small way some eighteen months ago in two counties in Massachusetts, and he is prepared to assist the wool growers and sheep raisers here if they care to undertake such a proposition.

Professor W. S. Carpenter of the Oregon Agricultural college was here today for the farm crops meeting held this afternoon. The meeting in the morning was of the rodent control leaders. Professor Gabrielson, also of the Agricultural College was present at the meeting this afternoon.

IS NAMED LEGION HISTORIAN

Eben Putnam Performed Similar Service Before the Office Was Made Permanent.

A life of singular variety and adventure has been that of Eben Putnam, new-chosen national historian of the American Legion. Mr. Putnam was born in Salem, Mass., Oct. 10, 1868. He received his education in private schools and the Cambridge high school. While he was a boy he was the companion and assistant of his father, the distinguished anthropologist, Prof. Frederic Ward Putnam, in archaeological explorations in various parts of the world.

Mr. Putnam has been deeply interested in genealogy, eugenics and New England histories, and has compiled and published a number of works on these subjects. He has conducted extensive investigations over a period of more than twenty-five years into the question of immigration. He is a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Military Order of Foreign Wars, and American Historical Society.

Early in the fall of 1915 Mr. Putnam became convinced that this country must enter the war eventually, and joined the training school organized in his state. He attended the Plattsburg camp the following summer and the next winter was a member of a provisional battalion of infantry. He was barred from a commission in the line because of his age, but on April 4, 1917, was commissioned a captain in the quartermaster corps. His son also was in the service.

Mr. Putnam served as assistant to the depot quartermaster in Boston and later served overseas in the fuel branch. He was discharged August 22, 1919. Mr. Putnam is a charter member of Wellesley Post No. 72 of the American Legion, and was insurance officer and post historian until he resigned to accept the post of department historian for Massachusetts, where he served also in the capacity of a member of the state executive committee. He had performed the duties of a national historian of the Legion before that office was made permanent.

TO BE GREAT WAR MEMORIAL

State of Indiana to Erect Magnificent Building to House Legion National Headquarters.

The erection of a magnificent building to house national headquarters of The American Legion in Indianapolis is assured following the action of the Indiana state legislature, which voted that the state war memorial should take the form of a structure for this purpose.

A tract of state-owned land in the center of Indianapolis, 900 feet long by 450 feet wide, will be dedicated to this project and the city has been authorized to include two additional city blocks adjoining the state properties. The result will be a splendid plaza with American Legion headquarters in the center. The land is valued at approximately \$12,000,000.

The Legion building will be constructed under the control of a board of trustees appointed by the governor of Indiana. All members will be men of the Legion. Already the Indiana legislature has voted a tax levy which will yield more than \$3,000,000 as an earnest of its desire to adequately house and equip national headquarters of the Legion.

SINCERE FRIEND OF LEGION

Mrs. Janette Logan Jacobs Has Been Hard Worker in Interest of Disabled Ex-Service Men.

A fearless and devoted worker in the interest of the disabled ex-service man, Mrs. Janette Logan Jacobs of New York city, has proved herself a sincere friend of the American Legion.

It was Mrs. Jacobs who supplied the Legion with many of the facts which it laid before congress when it demanded the reform of the federal board for vocational education, a reform which had been carried out largely under the direction of the veterans' organization.

Post Meets in Two Towns. When Lee-Bishop post of the American Legion was organized in the two towns of Hudson and Twinsburg, O., a novel scheme was hit upon to avoid jealousy between the communities. The post holds its sessions in the two places on alternate meeting nights.
