An up-to-date, live-wire advertiser inserts the following notice as his New Year greeting:

"Hello, 1921. If I remember correctly, 20 years ago eggs were ten cents a dozen, milk was five cents a quart, the butcher gave away liver, the hired girl worked for a dollar a week and did the washing. Women did not powder and paint (in public), play poker or shake the shimmy, and they were taught to cook at the age of three. Men wore whiskers and boots, chewed tobacco, spit on the sidewalk and cursed. Laborers worked ten hours a day and never went on a strike. No tips were given to waiters, and the hat-check graffer was unknown. No one was ever operated on for appendicitis, microbes were unheard of, folks lived to a good old age, and every year walked miles to wish their friends a merry Christmas.

"Today, you know, everybody rides in automobiles or Fords, plays the piano with his feet, goes to see Charlie Chaplin, smokes cigarettes, drinks hair tonic, blames the h. e. l. on the democrats, never goes to bed

The European Relief Council, which seeks to raise \$33,000,000 at the Christmas season, has been formed for the purpose of throwing the entire charitable energy of the United States into the vital task of providing food and medical assistance to 3,500,000 children in eastern and central Europe this winter. Representatives of eight great relief organizations, working independently, gathered overwhelming evidence that the plight of these unfortunate should take precedence in world charity until they are saved. The co-operating agencies which form the Council are the American Relief Administration, the American Red Cross, the American Friends' Service Committee (Quakers), the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.
