### Movie Closeups

"Cupid the Cowpuncher" was recently adapted from the well known story, "Alec Lloyd, Cowpuncher," by Eleanor Gates. The growing demand for a Will Rogers picture laid in the west led to this selection of a happy tale from a formidable list. It has all the elements of a perfect plot, thrills, comedy, color, romance and complications.  
"Cupid" Lloyd and his flock of carefree bolterous cowpunchers are the real west. The wild and woolly country of the old movie thrillers, with its scenes of two gun fighters, its scenes of preposterous melodrama and its impossible deeds of valor, existed mainly in the fevered imagination of scenario scribblers. But here is the real thing. Only one shot is fired in the whole picture, and that in part of a joke. Your audience will revel in the scenes of the corral, the picturesque herds of cattle, the roping, the daring riding, the care-free groups around the chuck-wagon. In it Will Rogers introduces something entirely new—the human note in the western photoplay.  
There is no resisting Will Rogers in the part of "Cupid" Lloyd, the cowpuncher, who kept the local minister busy hocking up the eligible couples of Briggs city. It is a role that allows him to "let go." Rogers doesn't have to act—he just lives the part.

The sacrifices that struggling artists make for each other, their bare attempt to achieve success in the face of poverty and an unympathetic world, and their childlike gaiety has been a favorite theme with the dramatists and authors. Du Maurier's famous novel "Trilby" was written against this appealing background, as was Edward Peple's almost equally famous play, "The Prince Chap" which has lately been produced as an unusually attractive motion picture by William DeMille. It will be shown at the Majestic theatre until Saturday Thomas Meighan has the role of the sentimental sculptor here in the London artist colony, Soho. A truly notable cast supports him including such favorites as Lila Lee, Kathryn Williams, Theodore Kosteroff, Ann Forrest, and Charles Ogil. It is a Paramount Artercraft picture.  
After five years of close contact with photography as both writer and director for the screen, William DeMille, the director of the "Prince Chap" has come to the conclusion that the one essential in a film drama is emotional appeal.  
"No matter how magnificent a spectacle a picture offers," said Mr. DeMille, "or how gorgeous are its scenic attributes, if the appeal of the heart is missing, it is so much dead wood. People go to the motion pictures for emotional enjoyment and if they do not receive it, they feel that their evening has been wasted. A lecturer or an evening with a book on science or philosophy may satisfy all the mental desires. It is the task of the protoplan to fulfill the demands of the human heart to be stirred."  
"The girl who goes to the theatre unconsciously slips into the role being played by the heroine. The love affair is hers, the heart ache is hers and the final denouement in her big moment. If the play lacks this human touch, no matter how well done it will never be a popular success."

### Post Office Income Shows Good Gain

Gross receipts at the Roseburg post office for the calendar year 1920 ending December 31, totalled \$25,513.90, a gain of 8.9 per cent over the receipts for the year 1919. The year 1921 lacked only \$600 of being an equal to the record year of 1916 when one of the biggest mail order houses in the country contributed nearly \$1,000 to the revenues of the office for postage on outgoing catalogues. Therefore, from a standpoint of normalcy, 1920 may be considered the best business year in the history of the office, all of its revenues being of local origin. While the total receipts were \$173 below those of 1916, the latter year had the advantage of a three cent postage rate
