New Speed Boat to Defend Title

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 6.—A speed boat capable of 80 miles an hour will be required to successfully defend the Harnsworth trophy, according to Car Wood, who captured the international trophy from the British holders off the Isle of Wight last summer.

Wood, who holds most of the speed records of the world, indicates that he did not believe a challenge would be forthcoming for the Harnsworth trophy in 1934. European power boat men realize, he said, that they must build a craft capable of close to 80 miles an hour in order to compete with the hydroplanes of the type of Miss America. He pointed out that Miss America's fastest lap in the recent Gold Cup race here was 75.5 miles an hour.

"This won't do for the next race of the Harnsworth trophy, however," he added. "We will be right there with that 80 mile an hour boat when the challenge for the international trophy comes."

Wood said prospects were bright for a Harnsworth race in 1934 that would shatter all records for speed.

Section Hand Is Stabbed by Mexican

Roy Tipton, of Winchester, section laborer employed with a crew working near that place, was stabbed in the side last night by Conrado Ortiz, a Mexican section hand. Ortiz brought his knife into action after Tipton had blacked his eyes in a fight which resulted over an argument regarding the Mexican's nationality. There were two Mexicans in the section crew, the other men being Americans, and the foreigners, it is stated, have been taunted by some of the other workers. Last night while the men were putting away their tools a fight occurred between Tipton and Ortiz, in which the former came out victorious, beating up his opponent quite handily in spite of the wound in his side, which was inflicted early in the fight. Tipton was brought to this city and the wound dressed by Dr. Lehrbach. Sheriff Starmer was notified and accompanied by Deputy Webb left at once. The section workers, however, had in an effort to scare Ortiz, threatened him with lynching and he evidently became frightened and slipped away from them and went into hiding in the hills. He was seen cutting through J. H. Clark's property on his way to the woods nearby. Although a search was made he was not apprehended today. Tipton's wound was not deep and will not be serious unless complications set in. He returned to his home at Winchester last night. The section laborers were instructed to appear in this city today and secure a complaint if they desired to prosecute, but up to a late hour this afternoon no complaint against Ortiz had been filed.

The pastor's report was a rather lengthy one, setting forth the achievements of the year, and also setting forth the plans for the future. The congregation from all sources last year raised something over \$7000; \$1211.85 was given for missions and benevolences. The pastor married 31 couples and conducted 23 funeral services. There were 80 added to the church, 30 by letter and statement and 50 by confessions and baptism. The congregation has a membership of 350. The church in its business sessions gave their minister a most pleasant surprise by raising his salary \$500 per year. Church, Mrs. Milton Church and Mrs. Belle Case. Chorister, Charles Stanton; Pianist, Mrs. Sarah Russell; Asst. Pianist, Mrs. C. H. Hilton; Church Clerk, Miss Blanche Reed; Asst. Chorister, Miss Ruth Wilcox; Treasurer, Dr. Lucetta Smith; Financial Secretary, Howard A. Uhlig; D. E. Carr was re-elected Bible School Supt., Chas. V. Stanton Asst. Supt., Miss Elsie Hudson Secretary, and Miss Jeanette Gibbs, Treasurer; Chas. Stanton, Chorister; Miss Ruth Wilcox, Pianist, and Calvin Webber, Librarian. The church then adopted a five year plan that was set before them by the minister, which had been worked over by a committee. The five year plan consisted of evangelism, stewardship, missions and the local field. The church is supporting its own missionary in the state of Oregon, and has large plans in view for this kind of work. The plan also included the idea of working to build a more commodious house of worship, and one that will better care for the growing Bible school and church. At the close of the business sessions refreshments were served and a happy social occasion enjoyed. The congregation also voted to dispense with its evening services during the Buhlin revival so that all who wished to might join in the revival work. The outlook for this congregation is very hopeful.
