YONCALLA, Ore., Jan. 7.—Willie Love, a farmer living five miles west of Yoncalla, was seriously injured this morning while falling from a tree. In some manner, in falling a tree, it caught another tree springing back striking Mr. Love and pinning him under it. He was unable to call for help and neighbors went to his rescue. They were unable to get him out for some time, but other neighbors arriving, they succeeded in moving him from under the tree. Dr. McKaig of Yoncalla was called and has fears that his thigh bone is broken. He will be taken to Roseburg on Jan. 17 tonight. Mr. Love's wife died about a year ago and Mr. Love was at home alone as his son Elmer, is attending the Y high school and his daughter Rachel was at Hayhurst school. Mr. Love's many friends hope that his injuries will not prove as serious as anticipated.

No Travel Over Coos Bay Line

EUGENE, Jan. 7.—At the Southern Pacific offices this morning it was reported that additional trouble of some kind had occurred at the scene of the big slide at Bufo, on the Coos Bay line, and that the telegraph line had been carried away. In the absence of any means of communication no attempt was made to dispatch trains. Although the recent slides have made the transfer of the passengers and baggage impossible, it is probable that a train would be run over the line to the scene to accommodate the traffic arising if communication is established.

Mr. Lewis, traveling passenger agent for the district has been over to the scene and states that the later slide is more serious than the previous one, as instead of the track being buried from debris from above, the bed of the track has been dropped from under the ties by the sliding of a huge section of embankment into the Sulaw river, leaving the rails practically suspended in the air for a considerable distance. In order to open up the line again, it will be necessary to excavate a new foundation for the track in the bank, and this is precarious because of the fact that it is a shale formation and may not hold. Three construction trains are now at work on the slide.

Mayor Baker Flays Landlord

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—Mayor George L. Baker went on the war path yesterday when he was informed that a woman with three small children had been evicted by deputy sheriffs from an apartment. The woman applied to the court of domestic relations for aid. Mayor Baker, accompanied by Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins, went to the apartment to inquire as to the reason for the eviction.

"I understand," Mayor Baker told the apartment house manager, "that legally you possess authority to throw a tenant into the street after the matter has been through the courts, but I want to say here and now that to my way of thinking no white man would let a matter of dollars and cents influence him to any such action. I do not know what kind of lodgers these people were and I do not care. I do not know whether or not they paid their rent promptly and I do not care about that."

"What I do care about is the fact that a woman, with three children, not one of whom is more than five years old, has been thrown onto the street penniless and in the middle of winter. As I say, I cannot do anything but I wish I could. It may be law but it is not justice."
