Judge Talks on Sacred Marriages

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 12.—United Press.—Circuit Judge W. N. Gatens interrupted proceedings in a divorce case here when the defendant was asked a question by one of the attorneys. It wasn't that Gatens objected to the question; but he wanted to answer it himself.

Mrs. A. C. Schmidt, who was being sued for divorce by her husband, a well-known local physician, was asked by her lawyer if she believed marriage to be sacred. "I can answer that question," interrupted Judge Gatens. "Not one out of 100,000 marriages is sacred. They are mostly marriages of convenience, in which the man wants a housekeeper and mistress and the woman a home. Too much is expected of each other in the marriage relation."

"The day is past in which woman has to take what man wants to throw at her, and the war is largely responsible. It made women more independent. She is not willing to be a slave and raise children and take the mite a man is willing to give her in return."

"Man and wife should be partners in everything, not only love and affection, in the ideal marital relationship. Marriage is sacred only when there is peace and happiness."

Gatens, after hearing all the testimony, concluded the trouble in the Schmidt family was "just a scrap to see who's boss," and that both sides were "at fault." He gave the husband the decree, however, but divided the custody of the only child between the two parents.

KLAMATH BANK CLOSED.

SALEM, Jan. 12.—The First State and Savings bank of Klamath Falls was closed today by Frank C. Braunwell, state superintendent of banks, who said that a depleted reserve was the cause. Further action depends on developments resulting from an examination of the bank, which is under way, said Mr. Braunwell.

Notices posted by the examiners who closed the bank stated the belief that the bank is solvent, but the withdrawals resulted in depleted reserves, making closing necessary to protect the depositors. Hope has been expressed for reorganization within sixty days. The shrinkage of cattle and sheep is said to be responsible for the bank's condition.

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING
