Bank to Install Burglar Alarm

At the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Douglas National Bank held last Tuesday afternoon, all of the old directors and officers were re-elected for the coming year. The directors are J. H. Booth, E. L. Parrott, H. H. Stapleton, F. P. Clemens, H. Wollenberg and Joseph Micelli, of Roseburg, and Ray Booth of Yoncalia and James T. Tufts, of Grants Pass. The officers are J. H. Booth, president, E. L. Parrott, vice-president, H. H. Stapleton, cashier, F. P. Clemens, assistant cashier. The directors voted to install a new burglar alarm system for the protection of its vaults, and a contract was then entered into with the Norris Safe and Lock company, for the system which will be put in at once. An electrical device will operate, in the event of a robbery, a huge gong at the office of the city police and the sheriff's office. The gong is very loud and will be audible for a considerable distance.

PROTESTS CHANGE IN LAW.

Editor News-Review:
 In regard to changing the closed season on chinook salmon, as outlined by J. A. Zachary, representative of the lower river fishermen, will say the present season on chinooks should not be changed. At present a great many chinook salmon go up the south fork of the Umpqua river to spawn, while if the season was made 15 days later the water of the south fork becomes warm and then practically all of the salmon go up the north fork. We would thereby lose the use of all the spawning beds of the south fork.
 Mr. Zachary speaks of not being able to fish more than 50 per cent of the lower river. This might sound all right to people who were never there and never saw those fellows fish, but to one who has been there and knows better it sounds like a— Mr. Zachary also states that they never had a late run of silversides last fall. I prophesied four years ago that they would practically exterminate the silverside salmon, as the season was dry and the water low and the open season for silversides lasting until Nov. 20, or after the silverside run was over. With no silverside spawn there will be no silverside. Now that the silverside species of salmon is practically extinct, they want the season changed on chinooks so they get the most or larger part of them. If this law is changed, the chinook salmon will also become very scarce in a few years.
 I claim that these fish belong to the people at large; not to a few union fishermen and two or three capitalists.

Chicago Man Claims Greenwich Village

 CHICAGO, Jan. 13—H. Wilkins Bloodgood, of Chicago, descendant of George Clinton, pioneer governor of New York, and vice president of the United States during the administration of Thomas Jefferson, and James Adams, was preparing today to bring suit against the city of New York and the heirs of John Jacob Astor for the possession of Greenwich Village.

The basis of the suit is the sale of what is now Greenwich Village by Governor Clinton in 1805 to John Jacob Astor. At the time of the sale, the governor owned the property on which the village now stands, and other real estate extending to the water front. The sale, according to Bloodgood, specifically exempted the waterfront, but it is now claimed that through graft and workings of the famous Tweed ring in New York years ago, the property exempted had been appropriated by persons having no right to it.

Clinton Genet, of France, whose name was familiar in early American history, and who married the only daughter of Governor Clinton, fought for the land, but politics and poverty defeated his efforts, according to Bloodgood.

The heirs of Governor Clinton recently obtained a copy of the map of the original Astor estate, according to Bloodgood, and again the legal battle is to be fought out in the courts.
