Murderer Pays Death Penalty

(By Associated Press.) LAS CRUCES, N. M., Jan. 14.—Jesse O. Starr, who was convicted of murder in the first degree for complicity in the slaying of Sheriff D. B. Stephens of Luna county, New Mexico, February 20, 1916, paid the death penalty for the crime today when he was hanged.

On the morning of the murder, Starr was a prisoner in the Luna county jail at Deming. With four other prisoners, it is alleged, he then overpowered the jailer and locked him in a cell. The prisoners then sent out a call for a taxicab. When it arrived, the driver was seized and also locked in a cell and the prisoners, arming themselves with guns and ammunition from the jail escaped in the automobile.

When the news had spread that the prisoners had escaped, Sheriff Stephens organized a posse and started in pursuit. The prisoners were overtaken near Rincon, not far from Deming, and a gun battle ensued. In the battle, Stephens was killed. Starr was shot through the knee, one of the escaped prisoners was killed, and the third one, named Dashiely, escaped.

At the trial which opened here in March, 1916, Starr was convicted and sentenced to hang. Charles Schmid, another of the prisoners, was sentenced to life imprisonment. Another of the prisoners, Acosta,

was acquitted. Starr appealed to the state supreme court, where the decision of the lower court was affirmed. He then appealed to the United States supreme court, where, early last November, it was dismissed for want of jurisdiction. County officers here say that they believe that "Starr" is not the prisoner's real name. He comes, it is said from a prominent Texas family.

CATTLE RUSTLERS ACTIVE

(By Associated Press.) RENO, Nev., Jan. 14.—Cattle rustlers are costing the Nevada livestock industry a half million dollars annually, according to Secretary Vernon Metcalf, of the Nevada Livestock Association.

The annual loss, Metcalf said, is placed at 15,000 cattle. The Nevada herds at present number approximately 300,000 head. Small bands of rustlers are responsible, it is stated.

PARK TRAVEL IS HEAVY
