## TIME FOR STERN MEASURES.

As a result of the criminal activ-  
 ity from which the whole country is  
 suffering there is a very general de-  
 mand that there be a suspension of  
 all light sentences, paroles, pardons,  
 easy bail requirements and the like  
 in criminal cases. There is little  
 doubt that such a proceeding would  
 have a wholesome effect upon the  
 situation.

Those who are deeply interested  
 in prison reform object to this re-  
 moval of clemency, and call attention  
 to the numerous actual reforms  
 which have been made under the  
 lenient system. It is of course un-  
 fortunate that the man who might  
 prove a desirable citizen if he were  
 second chance should be forced to  
 forego it because another man  
 would resume his evil ways. But  
 after all, what brought the first man  
 into custody? He is a law-breaker,  
 a deliberate enemy of society if he is  
 not a crazy one. In which case he  
 manifestly should be restrained. If  
 he wanted to enjoy the freedom of  
 his fellow citizens he had the same  
 opportunity to keep within the law  
 as they did. If he regrets his choice  
 later, that is up to him.

At any rate, under the clemency  
 system crime has increased alarm-  
 ingly, and is far more rampant in  
 this country than in those where less  
 mercy is shown. If the removal of  
 its advantages will keep men straight  
 in the first place, there can be little  
 doubt which is better for the indi-  
 vidual and society. It is time for a  
 revival of the more drastic system.

## NEWS IN THE TOMB.

Samuel Radges, a business man of  
 Tappan, Kan., who died recently, has  
 been buried in a vault which he him-  
 self erected several years ago, and  
 which is equipped with an electric  
 light kept constantly burning.

This in itself is not particularly  
 remarkable. Many people have want-  
 ed light in the tomb, for use in case  
 they should chance to survive. But  
 this case is different. The deceased,  
 it appears, has also arranged for a  
 newspaper to be delivered at the  
 burial vault every day, and has paid  
 up the subscription for 20 years.

The reader naturally wonders what  
 ideas Mr. Radges entertained regard-  
 ing the state of man after death. A  
 sort of analogy is found in the cus-  
 toms of certain races, especially the  
 ancient Egyptians. The Pharaohs  
 were buried in vaults supplied some-  
 times with lights that were meant to  
 be kept burning for a considerable  
 time. There were also instructions  
 printed on the mummy casing, the  
 casket and the walls of the tomb, for  
 the deceased to read, telling him  
 how to proceed in crossing the dark  
 river and appearing before his Maker  
 for judgment.

These old Egyptians, however,  
 were interested only in getting to  
 heaven. Mr. Radges seems to have  
 assumed that he was going to re-  
 main interested for a considerable  
 time in the affairs of earth, and  
 therefore did his best to make sure  
 of keeping in touch with them by the  
 means he was accustomed to read his  
 paper. Perhaps he is still alive. But  
 that daily paper, who knows. If he  
 is a one-sided fellow, but gives  
 successful return. The living are at  
 no time much interested in getting  
 news from Mr. Radges as he can pos-  
 sibly be in getting news from them.

## SUTHERLIN ITEMS.

SUTHERLIN, Or., Jan. 14.—One  
 of the largest realty deals negotiated  
 here in some time was closed today

The ranch comprises 302 acres, 40

Western Union  
Service Extended

The Western Union Telegraph com-  
 pany announced today receipt of a  
 decision to proceed with immediate  
 construction work of six additional  
 transcontinental copper wires from  
 Pacific coast points to New York and  
 additional wires between principal  
 centers in Washington, Oregon, Cali-  
 fornia and neighboring states. It is  
 understood that the new facilities  
 touching the coast will alone involve  
 an expenditure of about two million  
 dollars and add sixteen thousand  
 miles of wire to the present plant in  
 addition to new construction being  
 favorably considered throughout the  
 United States.

Belief is expressed by local busi-  
 ness circles that this investment in  
 essential trade facilities to the Pa-  
 cific coast is evidence of extensive  
 plans for resumption of normal busi-  
 ness conditions, as the Western Union  
 system of transcontinental wires  
 over eight routes is understood to be  
 ample for all present requirements  
 of traffic running into millions of  
 telegrams monthly.

Western Union officials here said  
 today that while the new circuits  
 possibly permit greater attainments of  
 an increase in speed the chief pur-  
 pose of the new wires is to keep far  
 ahead of a heavy telegraph business  
 which is expected to result upon the  
 complete recovery of normal business  
 conditions and to meet the present  
 trend among commercial concerns to  
 carry on business at a faster rate. It  
 is declared that this tendency has di-  
 versed to the telegraph lines a large  
 volume of communications formerly  
 sent by mail and that all construc-  
 tion plans are being estimated ac-  
 cordingly.
