BE REPORTED MONDAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—With ten amendments added the house emergency tariff bill approved by the senate finance committee, will be reported to the senate Monday. One of the amendments agreed to yesterday was that of placing a duty on certain dairy products and was changed today, a higher rate being accepted. The amendments accepted today included sugar, \$2.13 per 100 pounds until the retail price reaches ten cents, frozen meats of all kinds 2 cent per pound and all other meat 25 per cent ad valorem, apples 2 cents per box and cherries 4 cents per pound.
