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Broadway's Bright Lights Checked Sharkey's Rise

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Broadway is an undefeated champion.

Every country has its Broadway and its long list of victims.

As an old timer remarked once: "You can fight the bright lights for a while, but your eyes can't hold out. It'll get you in the long run."

The latest victim of the "great white way" is little Jack Sharkey.

Within a stone's throw of America's most noted playground he began his career and within a stone's throw of that long winding trail he seems to have ended it.

In one year, the little Italian waif from the tenements of the west side rose from obscurity to a place within an inch of fame and fortune. In the short span of a few months he fell.

Sharkey wasn't heard of until he broke through in that characteristic way of the ring and beat Jimmy Wilde, world's flyweight champion and one of the greatest men in the history of the ring.

Fortune smiled on him. The value of his services in the ring rose to thousands of dollars. He fought his way through the bantamweight ranks until the chance for a fling at the championship rested between himself and Joe Lynch.

Their first fight in Madison Square Garden went down with some of the greatest bouts of all times. It ended in a fair draw. Little Sharkey that night looked like a sure champion.

He got \$10,000 for that fight. Raised in poverty, deprived of an education in the struggle for a livelihood, he found the door open to everything that had been lacking in his life.

Flattered by his "hangers on" he sought with a free purse to acquire that empty name of a "good fellow."

He was told he was so good he didn't need to train. And he didn't.

Then came his second meeting with Lynch, a boy who lived within earshot of the noise of Broadway, but who was too wise to get any closer.

Sharkey was knocked out and lost the opportunity for the championship which Lynch took advantage of and made good.

Then came an opportunity to earn another chance and he was knocked out again by Roy Moore, of St. Paul, a boy who would have been a champion block for him a few months ago.

Sharkey is only a youngster of twenty-two. Maybe he has learned? Maybe he can come back? He has indomitable courage and the heart of a fighter. Perhaps he will get down to the life of sacrifice that a ring champion has to follow? He's in Hot Springs now taking the baths.

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Baseball as Played Sixty Years Ago

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 17.—(United Press.)—Baseball fans of sixty years ago were just as rabid as those of today, according to the summary of a game played at Baltimore, Maryland, on October 6, 1869, printed in a paper called "Wilkes' Spirit of the Times," which at that time was an authority on all sports. A Springfield sporting man has a copy of the issue.

The rival teams were the Brooklyn, New York, "Excelsors" and the Baltimore "Orioles." With no pop bottles nearby, the bugs probably didn't know what they were missing. The three thousand spectators maintained good order, with exceptions of "occasional annoyances from the crowd pressing too close upon the catcher."

The regular Baltimore pitcher's pillow perhaps was packed by a wise gambler, for "Mr. Patchen who came out to witness the game, kindly volunteered to pitch and exhibited beautiful play."

Mr. Patchen would have received

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a beautiful panning at New York's present stamping ground on Coogan's Bluff. He "allowed" just 51 runs. In the sixth inning, Brooklyn—New York made 13 runs. The final score was 51-6.

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Memorials to Animals Died In War

LONDON.—(By Mail to U. P.)—The hundreds of dumb animals who made the supreme sacrifice in doing their bit for Britain are to have a national war memorial. Few people realize how many classes of beasts and birds contributed their share towards the final victory. A list of animals that were of inestimable value to the allies has now been published and comprises:

Horses, dogs, mules, camels, elephants, oxen, mice, reindeer, pigeons, canaries, cats, goldfish. Hundreds of elephants lost their lives on the eastern front, where they acted as patient beasts of burden for the haulage of heavy guns. Reindeer were invaluable to the Russian campaign. No fewer than 120,013 camels were killed. The horses sacrificed their lives in thousands. On the western front alone 264,130 were killed.

Faithful dogs of all classes proved themselves wonderfully intelligent in fulfilling their duties of carrying messages, transporting field-telephone instruments, Red Cross service and sentry duty. Gold-fish rendered valuable military service, too. They were placed in the water in which gas-helmets had been washed and absorbed in their bodies the chemical that had been employed by the Germans in the preparation of the gas, and from the knowledge thus gained chemists were able to counteract the effects of such gas.
