"Barnyard Golf"

Popular Sport

(By Associated Press.)

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Jan. 17.—Barnyard golf, as the sport of the art of pitching horse shoes has come to be popularly known, thrives in Florida, which always has been the scene of the enthusiasts of the game in winter. Its supporters are looking forward to the national championship matches to be held here in February, on Washington's birthday. The champions, ex-champions and would-be champions at present are very busy practicing, and two dozen or more courts are kept running here from morning until night. The championship matches will attract crack pitchers here from all parts of the country.

The horse shoe pitchers have developed the game to a high degree. The equipment of a first class park includes a lodge or club house to keep the horse shoes in; a small hand laundry to wash and dry towels for use of the players during the game; hydrants of running water for the players to wash their hands after handling the shoes and pegs, which sink deep into the soft earth, and a raker to keep the ground smooth about the pegs during the matches, and a small blacksmith shop to keep the shoes and pegs in first class condition as the game is rough on them. The courts require a pitching distance of 36 feet. A match of two men is called a walking game as the players walk back and forth from peg to peg during the progress of the match. In a four man match the players play partners and remain in their places at the end of the court. In the tourneys 50 points is considered a game, while in the ordinary contests 1 point is required by the winner. A "ringer" counts about two and a half pounds each. They are the regulation horse shoes which have never been fitted to a horse's feet. Many fans carry their own shoes and bestow on them the same care that a golfer does on his clubs.

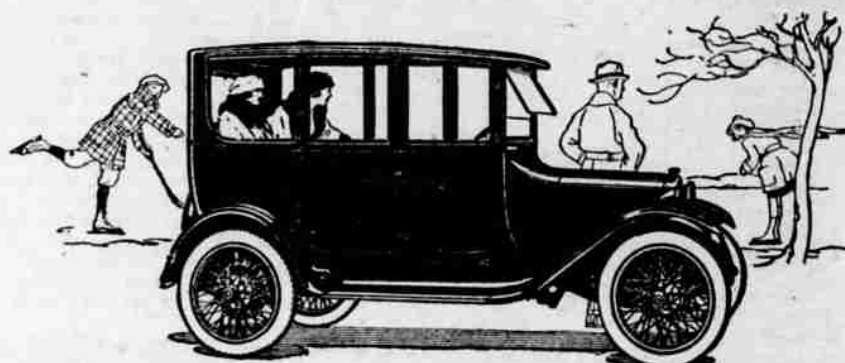
