

Tabernacle Was Packed Last Night

The tabernacle was packed to its capacity last night to hear the lecture on Christian Science, given by Mrs. Eddy. He has made a long study of the subject, studying under Mrs. Eddy herself. He has read every issue of "Science and Health" 153 times. Mr. Eddy's assistant, was sworn in by a notary public before the assembly to read from Mrs. Eddy's books, and took oath that he would read correctly. Many quotations were given and many instances cited to which they had been eye-witnesses.

He said in part as follows: "In delivering this lecture to you tonight there are several things I desire to make clear. First, I am not a scientist, for I have studied Christian Science, having read thru and thru all the literature sent out by the Mother Church; have read Mrs. Eddy's book over thirty times backward and forward, and have taken the course of lectures given by Mrs. Eddy personally, in Boston, designed for Readers. In considering this new doctrine, I want to be reasonable, fair and unprejudiced. I must be impartial and true to my oath as a Presbyterian clergyman. Being a man of strong convictions, I will admit I feel intensely, but such feeling as I have is based upon a clear intellectual perception of the pernicious influence of this Mrs. Eddy, the pretended discoverer and founder of what is known as Christian Science, upon domestic and religious life. I hold that Christian Science is a scheme of life—for it does not stop with the religious activities of its devotees, but extends into all their departments—is pernicious in the extreme; but it is not my purpose to enter upon a discussion of Christian Science as a religion or a philosophy of life, for it is not a church and has no right to wear the badge of the church. I am not fighting another church, for Christian Science denies all the fundamental doctrines of the church of Jesus Christ, and I have a right to tear the badge of the Cross and Crown from such a sect."

LONDON. (By mail to the United Press)—Eve was the world's first advertiser. It was because she pointed out the excellent qualities of fruit that Adam and she found themselves outside the garden of Eden. If Eve hadn't "boosted" the apple, Adam would never have partaken.

These facts were pointed out by Sir Robert Horne in a speech at the opening of the Advertising Exhibition here. The serpent, he said, was the advertising agent who knew his job well. He advertised his goods through Eve, because he knew she had a "pull" with the public, he was

trying to reach, or in other words, poor old Adam.
