Prune Industry In Europe Gains

Although there is no danger to the prune industry of the northwest from importations of prunes grown in Serbia and other southern European countries, there is a probability that within a few years those countries will be keen competitors. Before the war Austria and the Balkan countries were rapidly increasing their acreage in prunes. According to the United States commerce report of October 20, 1920, Serbia alone has 453,620 acres in prunes. Serbia produces about 20,000 metric tons annually and Bosnia about 23,000 tons. About 40 per cent of these prunes are used in the making of prune brandy, 40 per cent is dried and the remainder made into jam.

Photographs of several streets of London slums were taken by Miss Pickford's English representatives and these were sent to the studio, and exact reproductions were constructed in the huge lot adjoining her dressing room. Several other authorities on life and costume in the Soho districts were also called in and the work was continued until the settings and scenes were pronounced perfect even to the most minor details.

"The Idol Dancer," Griffith's spectacular production of the South Sea Islands, will be shown at the Majestic Theatre again tonight. "The Idol Dancer" is a picture with a history in many respects. SCORCHED MONEY IS GOOD

Government Will Redeem It If It Is Possible to Recognize It as Currency.

When the Chicago fire occurred and subsided many people scrambled through the embers to find the safes in which their money had been put away. With impatient hands these safes were opened to see the condition of the contents. In many instances this haste was expensive.

Flames were not able to penetrate these safes to consume the contents. Being airtight there was not enough oxygen in them to create a blaze. But in many of them there was still heat. When air was let into these safes they burst into flame and the contents were consumed. Had they not been opened their contents would have been intact.

By the time the Baltimore and San Francisco fires came such safe owners as banks had acquired more wisdom. Ample time was given for them to cool off. In most cases it was found that the paper money was dried and lifeless but still intact. Much of it went back into circulation. More of it was replaced by the government with new money.

Even when little but ashes is left the government will redeem burnt money if the bills are still recognizable. Such bills, carefully packed in cotton batting that they may not be ground into a powder, are still as good at the treasury as though they were in the original form. They will be identified and released.

CAME WITH THE GLACIERS

Little Cinquefoil Made First Visit to America Hundreds of Thousands of Years Ago.

Near the very tip of Mount Beacon, on the Hudson highlands, there grows a small white flower known to botanists as "Polentilla tridentata," or three-toothed cinquefoil. Its history is as long as its name, and goes back hundreds of thousands of years. In that remote period of the world the glaciers came creeping down from the north, burying under snow and ice all the country north of Long Island and central New Jersey. The cinquefoil came with it, for the cinquefoil is a hardy little chap, and loves the bitter weather as much as the familiar snow blossoms.

When the glacier took up the great retreat a few flowers and a few birds and beasts were left stranded in a climate that slowly but surely warmed until the summers were almost tropical in their heat, and, not being designed for such torrid days, the species slowly died out, first the flowers, then the beasts and lastly the birds, until now there are many varieties that have been destroyed. The cinquefoil is one of the few that remained true to type, and is now found in plenty near the Arctic circle. In appearance it resembles somewhat the wild strawberry plant both in blossom and leaf, although the fruit is not edible, being small, dry and bitter.

In the Superior Class.

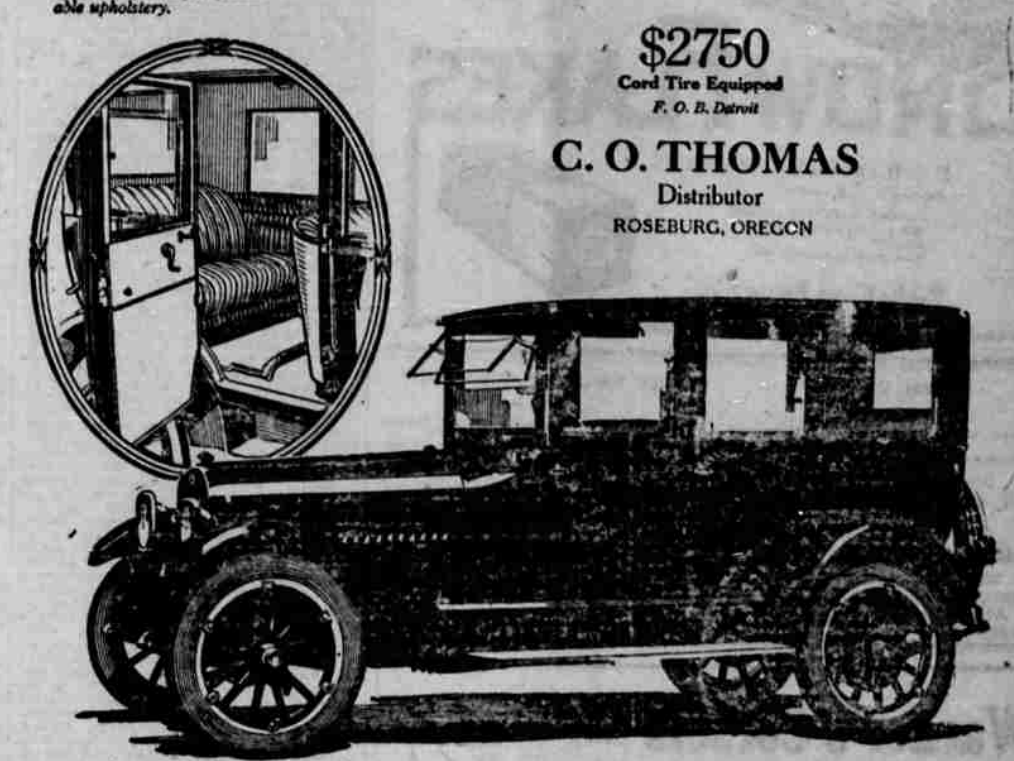

KNOW MONEY BY PICTURES

How Those Who Handle Many Bills Find It Comparatively Easy to Tell Bad Ones.

It is a comparatively easy matter to become an expert in the quick handling of money and also to detect bills that have been raised, according to those who have tried. A large proportion of the bills now in circulation are federal reserve notes. Those in common use have identification characteristics, in addition to the numerals, easy to memorize.

Cashiers who handle large and small bills rapidly usually memorize the portrait on the bills, which are large enough to be unmistakable as the major mark of identification, with the numerals as the minor aid. The two combined are well-high infallible, save in the case of clever counterfeiters.

As the raising of bills is accomplished with the numerals, familiarity with the portraits, and comparison, will verify the proper denomination of the bills. The portraits on the federal reserve bills in everyday use are as follows:

- One-dollar notes, portrait of George Washington.
- Two-dollar notes, portrait of Thomas Jefferson.
- Five-dollar notes, portrait of Abraham Lincoln.
- Ten-dollar notes, portrait of Andrew Jackson.
- Twenty-dollar notes, portrait of Grover Cleveland.
- Fifty-dollar notes, portrait of U. S. Grant.
- Hundred-dollar notes, portrait of Benjamin Franklin.
