A modern and fully equipped motion picture operating room and apparatus has been made a part of the equipment of the Yoncalla schools, as a result of school activities at that place. Every Friday evening the people of that town are entertained and instructed by a show arranged and conducted by the student body. On last Friday night Julian Josephson's famous story, "String Beans," featuring Charles Ray, was shown in connection with a three reel educational furnished by the University of Oregon. This latter picture depicted the manufacture of condensed milk, a complete tour of the famous Borden factory being shown. The projection room is strictly fire proof and has been constructed outside of the auditorium of the school house. A brick wall separates the projecting room from the auditorium, there being an aperture to allow the pictures to be shown upon the screen. A small admission price is charged for these performances and the money is used to pay for the purchase of the machine and the cost of installation and film rental.

FARM BUREAU TO DRIVE FOR MEMBERS

Campaign to Enlist Every Douglas County Farmer to Start Feb. 7

SPEAKERS SCHEDULED

Drive Will Be Launched By E. T. Reed, Editor of College Publications, who Will Conduct 5 Meetings in County.

An important movement vital to the interests of every farmer of Douglas county and the state of Oregon was launched last week by the executive committee of the Douglas county Farm Bureau. At this meeting the plans were perfected to put on in Douglas county an intensive campaign for members. The goal is set for 700 family memberships, each member being for \$5.00 with the option of signing up for life or short-term period of years with the privilege of withdrawal after the first year.

The Oregon State Farm Bureau Federation will co-operate in this drive. Fifteen other counties of the greater Farm Bureau area, and will roll up a large membership for their own bureaus.

The American Federation of Farm Bureaus will co-operate through the special representative, George L. Gray, of Albany, Mo., who will undoubtedly have the management of the campaign.

The drive will start February 7. Douglas county farmers will be trained as solicitors, and every Douglas county farmer will be visited on his own farm, so that he may have the opportunity to join the Greater Farm Bureau in its county, state and national work.

The membership campaign will be preceded by a speaking campaign which will give every farmer an opportunity to hear a presentation of the County Farm Bureau work, the State Federation activities and the work and activities of the American Farm Bureau Federation," says County Agent H. E. Haslett.

President Mansfield will be present in the county during part of the week and assist in this campaign. Places and dates will be announced later.

The farm bureau gives service to every farmer in its county work and maintains county agents, home demonstration agents and boys' and girls' club agents. In the state work the Oregon Farm Bureau will be the spokesman for the farmer in legislation, marketing, economic investigations and other work too great for the county bureaus.

Then at the top is the American Farm Bureau Federation, which now has thirty seven states federated as members, representing about 1,500,000 actual farmers of these states. This powerful organization, strongly financed as it is at this time, is successfully caring for those interests of the farmer that are too difficult and too general in their character for the state to handle.

Every farmer of Douglas county should thoroughly inform himself in this great movement and be ready to become a member when called upon.

There will positively be no soliciting for membership at these meetings.

Sarah Jane Adams was born in Bedford county, Virginia, September 22, 1857.

At the age of four years she moved with her parents to Lafayette county, Missouri, and in 1857 crossed the plains with an ox team. They were 6 months and 5 days in crossing the plains and stopped at the forks of the Willamette river, at a little place called Vandine. Her mother and two brothers died on the journey.

In 1854 she was married to George Adams. To this union were born nine children, five boys and four girls. Five children survive her: Mrs. Angie Hudson of Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. Clara Kennedy of La Jolla, Calif.; Mr. Geo. H. Adams of Myrtle Point, Oregon; Mr. David Adams, of Montana; and Sam S. Adams of Myrtle Creek, Oregon.

She united with the Methodist church in 1862, later transferring her membership to the Christian Church in Myrtle Creek, Oregon. She passed away Thursday morning, January 26, 1931, at 3 a. m.

Secretary of Pacific Northwest Tourist Association Visits Southern Ore.

OTHER CITIES ACTIVE

Ashland Getting Ready to Take Care of All Visitors for the Coming Summer and Roseburg Should Begin Activities Soon.

PORTLAND, Jan. 21—The tourist travel to the northwest will be 50 per cent greater this year than it was last, declared Herbert Cuthbert, who, for an executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association he keeps his finger on the pulse of the American pleasure traveling body.

Mr. Cuthbert, who is in Portland today on his way to Seattle from a tour of Southern Oregon, gives as the reason for the great number of visitors who will reach this frontierland during the coming months the following:

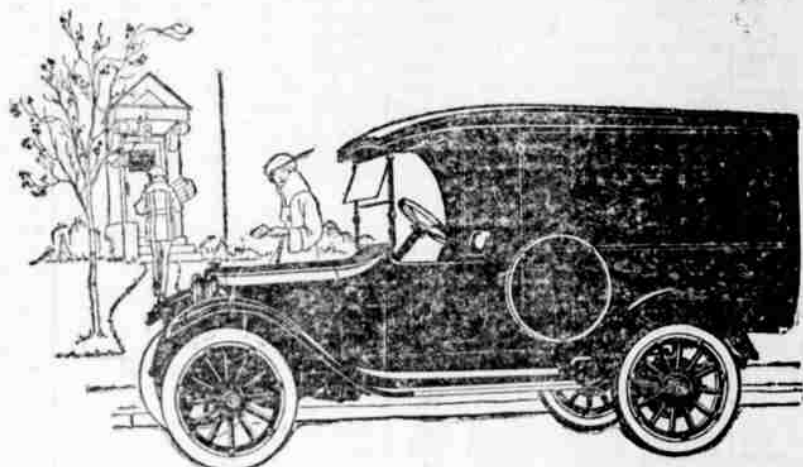

The tourist expert visited Corvallis under the invitation of Claude E. Foxall, president of the Chamber of Commerce there. The Benton county city is trying to put over a new \$200,000 hotel, and Mr. Cuthbert's visit was to boost the work along. He spoke before the Business Men's club, and was able to instill renewed interest in the proposed plan by explaining what a great drawing card it will be for tourists.

Ashland is Visited

It is stated that \$120,000 has already been subscribed in Corvallis, and \$100,000 in Portland, with the promise for many more thousands in Benton county. It is thought that the work on the new Hotel Benton will begin this spring.

The tourist expert visited Ashland and thinks this city will become one of the leading tourist centers of the western country, west of the Rocky mountains. The leading hotel there has been sold to New York capitalists who are expected within a fortnight. Plans are on foot to build a tourist's inn that will cost between \$300,000 and \$400,000. This, in connection with the wonderful mineral springs and the great arts camp that is connected on, successfully will make the southern Oregon city a widely known western Mecca.

Predicts New Hotels

The executive secretary also thinks that Medford and Grants Pass will become legitimate spots on the tourist map. He thinks that the big rush of tourist travel will come in the summer. A smaller effort to build new hotels and to improve the existing ones is being made in Medford and Grants Pass. He is sure that the tourist trade can be taken care of in the way it will demand.
