Darkey Services Greatly Enjoyed

There was no special delegation in attendance at the tabernacle last night but the house was filled to about its capacity. The services partook of the unique, because of the limitation of the darkey religious songs of the south. To many of us who had witnessed scenes of this kind it was a new and interesting feature. The colored people in their religious services are very devout and very emotional, and this phase of their religious service was brought out in the song service. Then the offering of the evening was taken by marching around to the table and depositing the money there, singing all the time. Everyone in the big audience came around.

In the sermon last night the evangelist showed the origin of the Devil, reading directly from the Bible and with his theme, "If I were the Devil, What Would I do?" He said that he would dress to suit his business. He would bring about all the extravagance in dress possible. That he would give the greatest pleasure, but in doing so he would be doing his work upon lives. He would try to go into the tent of society, and have a law of etiquette that religion and the name of Jesus would not be spoken. If I were the Devil, I would get people to believe in morality without the blood of Christ and have people look at the good moral man and how he lived and let that be an example, and in that way deceive a good many. If I were the Devil, I would get some of my imps on every church board and into the life of the church, also in the other public places and have them talk about it. If I were the Devil I would substitute a liberal code of life and call it broad thinking, for if I were the Devil, I would want to write the school books for the schools and colleges and insinuate into them materialistic evolutions and other matters to lead away from the Bible in Jesus. I would emphasize and institute man's intellectual attainments for spiritual. While a number expressed a willingness to pay an additional charge during the irrigation season, they were not in favor of installing meters, especially those citizens who would be obliged to install two—one at their place of business and another at their home. It is pointed out that if those citizens who habitually waste water and those citizens who are delinquent on their water payments, were cut off from the city mains, as provided by a city ordinance, there would be sufficient water for those who are paying for it and using it in a conservative manner. On January 24 there was approximately \$150 due the city from water users—and these bills are presumed to be paid by the 15th of each month or water shut off.

Think Employees Should Make Own Wage Reductions

(By United Press).
CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—The two million railroad employees should voluntarily cut their wages, in the opinion of the railroad executives' meeting held here today to discuss the labor wage situation.

President Besley, of the New Jersey Central railroad, a member of the labor committee of the association of railroad executives, said: "An arbitrary cut in wages for our employees would hurt. They should get together and tell the management that they are willing to accept a little less. William Lee, president of the railway trainmen, is on record as saying that it is not higher wages that the employees want, but purchasing power. The dollar has a greater purchasing power today."

Besley blamed the former government control and present supervision of the roads for the plight.

SUTHERLIN NEWS.

SUTHERLIN, Ore., Jan. 27.—Considerable resentment has been expressed here during the past several days in regard to the manner in which a number of scarlet fever cases are being looked after—or rather not looked after. Recently two children were brought here from out of town and permitted to take up their residence in a home where there was a case of scarlet fever, just as soon as the member of the family who had been ill with the disease was able to get about. The quarantine sign was removed from the residence and the several members of the family mingled with other citizens about town, one member of the family going so far as to attend a dance in Odd Fellows' hall. On Monday of the week the two children who had been permitted to take up their residence in the household were entered in the local school, and on Monday evening one of them was stricken with the disease. The matter was taken up with the state health officer, and he has informed officials here that the family must remain in quarantine for 30 days.
