Lawless Lawyer

Bill Introduced

Leland Brown, mailing clerk for the Oregon legislature, has sent the News-Review a copy of a "joker" bill introduced yesterday in the senate. The bill is for an act authorizing and regulating lawless lawyers in the state of Oregon; creating the Oregon board of lawless examiners; authorizing the practice of ambulance chasing and other remunerative systems of legal practice, and fixing the legal standing of licensees under this act. The bill reads as follows:

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

That there is hereby created the Oregon board of lawless examiners, hereinafter termed the board. The said board shall consist of three members to be appointed by the governor.

The board is hereby authorized to issue licenses to practice ambulance chasing, or any other remunerative system of legal practice, the basic principle of which differentiates it from other legal systems.

Lawless law is hereby defined to be: A system of applied legal procedure which has for its object the settlement of a case, and to this end makes use of suggestion, exercises, vibrations, manipulation, blackmail, mechanical and electrical instruments, and appliances, and other methods not regulated by the laws of Oregon, and includes the right to file cases before the supreme court, or any other court of the state of Oregon.

Attorneys licensed under this act shall have the same legal standing and authority as attorneys who have been regularly admitted to the bar and licensed under the laws of the state of Oregon.

The board is hereby authorized to

examine applicants in subjects peculiar to the system of lawless law which such applicant wishes to practice under the provisions of this act. Such examination shall be in writing and shall embrace the following subjects: Manicuring and camouflage, which subjects are hereby declared to be common and necessary to all systems of lawless legality covered by the provisions of this act. The fee for such examination shall be 10 cents, which shall in no case be returned to the applicant.

Nothing in this law shall be construed to apply to any barber in the use of massage, or vibration, when used upon the face and head; to massage, so long as they do not practice, or claim to be practicing, lawless law, or claim to be or hold themselves out to be lawless lawyers; to any one who shall engage in a domestic administration of family quarrels; or to any one who shall treat the legally entangled by use of prayer or any other method based upon religion or religious belief.

REVIVALS LAST ONE WEEK MORE

Great Plans Made for Services on Sunday and the Following Week.

ATTENDANCE IS LARGE

Tuesday Night Designated as High School Night and Many Stunts Will Be Staged That Evening by the Students.

Probably the greatest audience of the meetings assembled at the tabernacle last night. The crowd kept growing and growing until there was apparently no room left for people who came in. Two fine delegations were present. The Masons and Eastern Star came in one body, and they made a fine showing as they came marching in and took seats in the middle section. The singer was just about to make the business women on case singing in and saved the preachers. The women came singing, and their big delegation filled the front part of the center section. As we looked over that array of ladies, the evangelist remarked that if he were an old bachelor he surely would move to Roseburg. There were a fine lot of ladies, good looking ones and some not so much in looks, but whose goodness is unsurpassed. There were undoubtedly many unclaimed blessings in the company, and we saw some of the old bachelors looking at them with longing eyes. The business women had a program of their own. The high school girls' glee club sang a special number directed by Miss Moore, their teacher. They received a big encore, and of course had to sing again. Miss Phelps sang a couple of special songs dedicated to the Revival party and the tabernacle, and Mrs. Heinline led the entire business women in singing the chorus. Miss Lois Geddes led the business women in some yells, and they can yell all right, and Miss Lois, who had training as yell leader in the high school, was on to her job. But Lewis got enthusiastic, and he had to lead in a yell or two that nearly lifted the roof off the tabernacle. Another song by Miss Phelps was dedicated to the church and the noon day complimentary banquets. The evangelist then gave a fine talk to each of the delegations and all sang the appropriate song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The sermon was on "The Man of Galilee." The sermon was a study of years, and your correspondent cannot do justice to the sermon in the short space that would be used in the paper a sermon like that of last night. One at the tabernacle of men and boys over twelve years of age, with the subject, "Wine, Women and Gambling." Mrs. Lewis will conduct a meeting for women and girls at 12, at the M. E. church, with the subject, "Broken Hearts, Broken Homes and Broken Lives." Mr. Lewis will conduct a service for the children under 12 at the Presbyterian church. At 5 o'clock the young people of the Christian church will entertain in the Presbyterian church the young people of the other congregations at a light lunch, to be followed by a young people's meeting. Sunday night at 7 o'clock the evangelist will give another of his famous lectures, "Is There a Bible Hell?" He will give this from the lawyer's standpoint. Monday night his famous lecture on "The Unpardonable Sin." Tuesday night will be high school night, and the tabernacle will be decorated accordingly. The glow club will sing and the high school yells will be given. The sermon that night will be "The Unpardonable Sin of Men's Reasons." Other announcements for the week will be made later.
