Do Well Without Meat.

Less than a third of the world's population gets what we should call three good meals a day, yet the working capabilities of the, from our point of view, underfed continents of Asia and Africa will compare very well with either Europe or America. The average annual meat consumption of the world is 39 pounds a head, yet both the Australian and the American eat nearer 150 pounds per head, and the Englishman is not far behind with about 120 pounds.

Detector Warns Sub's Approach

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Dr. Willard R. Whitney inventor of a detector for giving warning of the approach of submarines, has been awarded the Perkins gold medal, one of the highest honors in science, in recognition of his many inventions through which he has applied chemistry to the service of mankind.

The medal is given for the highest achievements in applied science and is named for Sir William Perkins, a distinguished chemist and discoverer of first processes for the manufacture of aniline dyes from coal tar.

The submarine detector, which was put into practical application during the European war at the Nahant station of the United States, is probably Mr. Whitney's best known invention. As a member of the naval consulting board he also did much for the development of radio telephony and radio telegraphy while the conflict with Germany was in progress. He is now director of the research laboratory of the General Electric Company at Schenectady, N. Y.

Dr. Whitney, who was born in Jamestown, N. Y., is a director of the American Chemical Society of which he was president in 1909.

DREW CHARACTER FROM LIFE

Thackeray's "Beatrice" Said to Have Been Modeled on Career of Profligate Duchess.

One of the few feminine characters of Thackeray that was not declared insipid by critics, was his Beatrice. She was drawn from real life, and the original was the daughter of Col. Thomas Chubbleigh, afterward to become Elizabeth, duchess of Kingston. She married Augustus Hervey, earl of Bristol, after setting all London by the ears with her beauty, spirit and pranks. He was a member of the naval forces, and shortly after their secret wedding was called to sea, and when he returned found his wife the reigning beauty of the court and head over heels in half a dozen affairs, the one with the duke of Kingston being so notorious that even the street gossips knew of it. She managed to bring a suit for a facination, and her husband was subject to heavy penalties should he say she was his wife. She then married the duke.

Her great beauty was a storm signal wherever she went in London and Paris, and a long list of duels, ruin and trouble followed her wake. Although she lost a part of her fortune she continued to be received at continental courts up to her death at the age of sixty-eight, as wicked in her final years as in her youth. She got drunk, swore, had a dozen lovers, ruined as many more, and in fact did everything that should have brought her shame and sorrow, but lived a riotous life to the end.

MEDALLION HELD AS CURIO

Only One of a Number Struck in 1825 Is Believed to Be in Existence Today.

To defray the expenses incident to the inauguration of John Quincy Adams as the sixth President of the United States in 1825, the inaugural committee sold medallions at \$5 each. Five dollars was considerable money in those days, and the owner of a medallion was entitled to special consideration at the inaugural ceremonies.

As much as the medallions were prized 95 years ago, it is believed that only one exists today, the property of J. A. Larrick, a policeman detailed to Washington police headquarters.

The Adams medallion was given to Larrick 15 years ago by Edward Murphy, who is now dead. Murphy's father, who witnessed the inauguration of President Adams, was the original purchaser of the medal.

At the time he was presented with the medallion, Larrick was a policeman in the first precinct. Murphy was an aged bookkeeper. Larrick on several occasions assisted the old fellow and the medallion was his reward.

Probably the most striking thing about the medallion is its inscription, "Science Brings Peace and American Plenty."

Sarah Bernhardt Made Her Meeting With Longfellow an Event to Be Remembered.

When Sarah Bernhardt came to America in the seventies sculpture was her "side line." As soon as she arrived in Boston she expressed a desire to do the bust of Longfellow, says the Christian Science Monitor. Longfellow, however, though not insensible of the honor, declined. He said that he was about to leave for Portland, Me., and feared that Mme. Bernhardt would have departed before his return. Then, to mitigate the curtness of his refusal, he asked the tragedienne to his home, inviting William Dean Howells and Oliver Wendell Holmes to meet her.

They became very amiable toward one another, and Longfellow, who spoke excellent French, praised Mme. Bernhardt's performance of "Phedre," telling her she surpassed the great Rachel, whom he had seen 50 years earlier. The actress, not to be outdone, told the poet how much she enjoyed reading "Hawatha," which she pronounced Hea-vatere.

Evidently the affair of the sculptured bust did not rankle, for on her departure, as the poet and his other guests were escorting her to her carriage, she turned about suddenly, impulsively threw her arms about Longfellow's neck and, kissed him on the cheek, said: "Vous etes adorable."
