PLEASING SERMON BY REV. ALLEESON

Interesting Bible Story Applied to Conditions Prevailing in Modern Times.

FINE LESSON TAUGHT

Episcopal Rector Delivers Very Interesting Sermon at St. George's Church on Sunday—Text Taken From Luke.

(Sermon by Rev. T. R. Alleeson in St. George's Episcopal Church, Sunday, January 30).

Text: St. Luke 8:30. Jesus asked him, What is thy name? And he said, Legion, for many demons were entered into him.

The miracle of the healing of the Gadarene demoniac is one of the well known difficult passages of the Bible. The Bible is not all plain reading and easy to understand. The wisest Bible scholars do not offer to explain everything in the Holy Scriptures. It is not a sign of Biblical scholarship to say that the Bible contains no difficulties—that its contents are equally plain to read and easy to understand. Let us not be discouraged over the difficulties of Holy Scripture. We encounter difficulties in all other departments of life, and experiences teaches that life's difficulties are for our good. The Holy Spirit, who has caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning, included the difficult parts, and we may reverently believe it is for our good.

For the plain reader I know no better advice than that which the well known evangelist, Mr. Moody, used to give on this subject. He said: "Treat the difficulties of the Bible as you do the bones in the fish—lay them aside and enjoy the meat." So let us for the time being lay aside those things which are hard to understand and take home a few homely lessons from this old story.

In the first place it is apparent that the unfortunate man was afflicted with some trouble which affected his mind. A diseased mind was the cause of his strange conduct. The body is obedient to the ruling of the mind. We are just awakening to a realization of the importance of the mental state of people. Witness the change in the government attitude towards the immigrant. Formerly his chief concern was about his body—was it healthy, were there any germs of disease in his body? Now the government is asking about his mind. Is it healthy? Are there any ideas there which are inimical to our Constitution, to our social welfare, to our institutions, to our ideals? There are mental germs which are just as contagious, and as fraught with more danger than many disease germs. What ideas has the new immigrant about government, about relations between employer and employee, about education, the social order, the marriage state, the home and family life?

Physicians tell us that everyone has germs within them which may cause a fatal illness. The effect of the germs depends upon the condition of the body. The healthy body resists attacks of disease. But a sudden weakening and the germ is given full play and we are laid low.

This is equally true of mental germs: Envy, hatred, malice, revenge, theft, immorality, suicide, murder, and other evils. Some of these germs are in all of us. In the days of spiritual health we are enabled to throw off the attack, but when the spiritual life is weakened, then we fall. We admire the courageous man who is able to control thousands of savages, men like John McLaughlin, who had such wonderful control over the Indians in early Oregon days, or like General Gordon over Chinese and Africans. But is it not more wonderful that so many people keep in subjection certain latent forms of evil which they carry daily with them. Sometimes the community is shocked over the moral failure of one who has hitherto borne an excellent reputation. The wretched man may have been a hypocrite for years, but on the other hand he may have been suddenly subjected to a great spiritual awakening. Something has happened to let loose forces of evil within him. This moral and spiritual weakening was one of the evils of the liquor traffic. Many a man succumbed to evil tendencies within him which he might have resisted if his spiritual state had not been weakened thru liquor.

Our Lord bids us, "Watch and pray." "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall," says the Apostle. The purpose of re-

Religion is to enable the spiritual to dominate the natural man. The difference between those on the inside of the church and those on the outside is that the former, if they are sincere, realize the weakness of human nature and desire all they help they can get. They desire to be the kind of men and women God wants them to be, and they realize the need of help. The outsiders propose to raise themselves by their own shoe-strings—or they don't care.

It is not a far cry from the Gadarene demoniac to our own time. Many, like him, are possessed with demons; many are daily in danger of being possessed with demons. But the same healer, Jesus Christ, is close at hand.

Jesus said: "What is thy name?" And he said, "Legion." For many demons were entered into him. In Bible times a person's name not infrequently denoted some peculiar characteristic, some achievement, some distinction. Some times people had their names changed. Thus Jacob's name was changed to Israel, Simon's to Cephas, Peter, Saul to Paul.

"What is thy name?" The question was rather: "What are you?" And the poor wretch said, "Legion," an army, a multitude. A multitude of what? A multitude of demons! Evil things. All the goodness of his life had been driven out, and in its place there was a multitude of evil things. What is your name? Is it envy, hatred, malice? Is it selfishness, callousness, petulance and cynicism. Is it greed and lust? Oh is it love, joy, peace, long-suffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, meekness and self-control? What is thy name? What is thy name? Is it Legion? Or is it Christian? This is the purpose of religion, to change Legion into Christian. "Until Christ be formed in you," St. Paul prays for his Galatian disciples.

Yes, a miracle happened, Legion's name was changed to Christian. A poor lunatic is made well and restored to the company of his fellows—to his family and his home. The Bible assures us he had a home. How glad his neighbors must have been! But no, all the people round about were filled with fear and anger. They asked Jesus to go away! Jesus Christ was only tolerated when he didn't interfere with people's lives. It is equally true today. But as soon as Jesus Christ comes in contact with any member of the community or the family, he straightway interferes with the family. There is no other member. There is no such thing as neutrality with God. We are for Him or against Him.

How often we see a young woman of Christian training thoughtlessly marrying a Godless man and foolishly thinking that her religion will not be interfered with. One of the first things that happen is the interference with attendance at services on Sunday. Religion means nothing to her husband—he prefers to spend Sunday in his own selfish way, and insists that his wife and children go his way. "I hate to lose so many Sundays during the summer," said one of these women to me, "but I have to give up my church and go to the Sunday picnic in order to keep peace in the family." The mother is deprived of opportunity for worship and spiritual refreshment, and the children are kept away from Christian nurture on the day especially adapted for it. If the wife insists upon her way there will be a domestic disturbance. I not infrequently find that mothers are unable to have their children baptized because the Godless father won't allow it. "I am not come to send peace, but a sword," Jesus said. For I am come to set a man at variance with those of his own household. There is no such thing as neutrality on our part with God. We are either for or against Him. Jesus Christ always calls forth a protest from those who will not be his disciples.

Just a word about the pigs, and only a word, for they are the least important part of the story. Isn't it strange how much more interested some people are in pigs than in their fellow men. The death of the pigs doesn't interest me. I am not concerned about swine. But to some people—these Gadarenes and some of our own acquaintances—a few pigs are of infinitely greater value than a fellow man. Isn't it sufficient that a man was made whole? A poor crazed lunatic restored to his right mind and returned to his family? The community was enriched by one more healthy, well-balanced happy citizen. Surely the whole town will rejoice and give thanks to God; will welcome their restored fellow townsman home and make Jesus Christ the guest of honor! But no, they are apparently in no different in all this in their distress over the dead pigs.

And Jesus told the man to go home and tell his friends what God had done for him. That was a very hard thing for the man to do especially among such hardened callous, sordid neighbors as this man had.

To practice the Christian is difficult anywhere—especially in the home. It is in the home we are our true selves, there we are the best known. We cannot affect unnatural ways of speech or action in the home.

30,000 Autos Minus Their Tags

More than 30,000 Oregon automobile owners will be subject to arrest and fine under the provisions of the automobile registration law when the peace officers over the state begin to round up the delinquents today. This is based on the total registration of last year when 103,000 automobiles bore the Oregon license tag. It is altogether probable that there are many more cars than that in the state at this time subject to the registration law but not more than 74,000 will be entitled to use of the public highways after tonight under a strict interpretation of the registration law, for that is the number which has applied for the little green license plates up to this date.

There can be no valid excuse for the delinquents either. Secretary of State Koser began to sound the warning two months before the new year dawned, urging automobile owners to do their license tag shopping early. Then at the first of the year, laboring under a deluge of applications that had completely swamped the registration department, he extended the days of grace for delinquents until February 1. The department has been right up with the applications now for a week and licenses have been going out on the day applications are received, yet more than 10,000 automobiles in the state are not provided with the credentials which indicate their compliance with the registration law.

Legion Warns Against Solicitors

At the last meeting of Umpqua Post of the American Legion, a resolution was adopted warning residents of Douglas county against solicitors and agents representing themselves to be ex-service men and work for some patriotic organization, unless the solicitor carries a letter from the local post vouching for him. At the present time there are a great many men in the field soliciting for various things, nearly all of them dressed in uniform and claiming to represent some patriotic organization. All people being in sympathy with the ex-service men, the willingly purchase what a solicitor has regardless of whether or not they really need the article. It has been shown that many of these men never had any army service, are not associated with any patriotic organization and many of them are swindlers. Any man who is reliable will receive vouchers from the officers of the local legion post, and residents who are suspicious of solicitors should ask for these credentials.
