Mother of Local Lady Celebrates 100 Anniversary

A newspaper in Logansport, Indiana, contains the following article concerning Mrs. Sarah Rhea, who is the mother of Mrs. M. A. McCumber, of West Roseburg:

Two Komomo people, Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Gard, father-in-law and mother-in-law of City Judge C. H. Willis, yesterday had an interesting and unusual experience of attending an anniversary dinner at which there were 199 candles on the birthday cake.

The celebration was in honor of Mrs. Sarah Rhea, a Cass county pioneer, and was held in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank H. Crockett, in the village of Walton, 15 miles north-west of this city. Mrs. Rhea is an aunt of Mr. Gard.

Mrs. Rhea's maiden name was Sarah Rinehart. She was born in Preble county, Ohio, January 21, 1821. She was united in marriage with Robert K. Rhea in 1846. They came to Indiana, locating in Cass county in 1855. Mr. Rhea died in 1901. He sleeps in the Masonic cemetery at Young America.

Mrs. Rhea is known personally to nearly all the families in the south-eastern part of Cass county and the northwestern part of Howard county. Despite her extreme age she gets around unassisted. Yesterday she walked to the dinner table unassisted, refusing escort with the laughing statement that she had been getting to her meals without any help for a hundred years and that she was not going to start her second century by leaning on some one on the way to the anniversary feast. Her mind is in excellent condition, her memory being particularly accurate. Her hearing is but slightly impaired and her eyes are still so good that she still does crocheting without using glasses.

At the last session of the county court the recent order regulating weights to be carried by trucks on the roads and highways in Douglas county was somewhat modified. As the order now stands, it is provided that no vehicle having tires under four inches in width shall carry a load of more than 2,000 pounds, and that no vehicle having tires more than four inches in width but less than eight inches shall carry more than 2,500 pounds and that no vehicle with tires more than eight inches in width shall have a load of more than 4,000 pounds. The limiting of weights was made necessary by the damage being done to the roads during the extremely wet weather.

Broccoli Higher Says Local Grower

success, and articles like "Broccoli is lower" are not inclined to promote the welfare of those engaged in growing such an important crop in this vicinity. For instance, if you were a broccoli buyer, stopping at a local hotel, intending to do business with the broccoli growers, in what manner would the "Broccoli is Lower" article affect you? Would you feel encouraged to go out and contract at fair prices or would you be inclined to hold tight to your New York exchange? It happens that the writer is expecting some buyers any day now as the result of having sent a telegram to be read before the convention of the Western Fruit Jobbers Association at Colorado Springs last week. This wire not only stated an estimate of our own crop but stated the estimate of the entire crop here and expressed the opinion that cash buyers were invited to come. If that opinion were contrary to the one held by the larger association here the writer hastens to apologize—for he acted with the best intentions and the belief that the interests of all of the growers here, regardless of selling affiliations—are identical, the belief, based upon a life experience that it is far better for the producer to sell upon a cash basis at home rather than be tempted by alluring quotations in far away markets. So, Mr. Editor, please strike that "lower" lightly—if at all—and in reply, I'll keep on boosting. "Advertiser," that's your crop isn't it?

The speaker made some predictions. Kindly allow me to make some. "California cauliflower" is fast cleaning up, and all inquiries indicate that if Roseburg broccoli growers do not sell the present crop—the best one yet produced—at profitable prices, on a cash basis, it is their own fault.
