Sutherland to Dedicate Church

SUTHERLIN, Ore., Feb. 17—An all day program, featured with a basket luncheon at noon has been arranged for the dedication of the new Methodist church here next Sunday, February 20. The dedication sermon will be delivered by Dr. W. W. Youngson, district superintendent of the Portland district at the morning service at 10:30. The sermon will be followed by the dedication exercises and a fine musical program will be a feature of the morning service.

The afternoon service, which is scheduled for 2:30 will consist of messages of fraternal greetings from sister churches, and addresses will be made by Rev. J. R. Patterson of the Adventist Church; Rev. T. R. Alleeon, Episcopal church; Rev. A. J. Adams, Presbyterian church; Rev. R. A. Hutchinson of the Oakland Community church, and Rev. S. A. Dandridge, D. D. superintendent of the southern district will deliver the sermon in the evening. Good musical programs have been arranged for the afternoon and evening.

The new church, which is under the pastorate of Rev. Geo. P. Trites, through whose untiring efforts the building was constructed, covers a space 32 x 60 feet and will cost approximately \$8,500. The auditorium, which will seat about 200 people, is seated with opera chairs and is provided with a pulpit of generous proportions. Back of the pulpit is the choir room, the pastor's study and a room for the library and church records. These rooms are entered through a door on the east side of the pulpit. Five memorial windows and eight gift windows in the auditorium are of stained glass and cost approximately \$1,000. The memorial windows are for C. W. Parker, Mr. and Mrs. H. Orlean, and Otto Sauerman, (killed in France) and Rev. H. J. Van Fossen. The gift windows were donated by Archie Currier, E. H. Bethwell, D. W. Banker, Mrs. E. C. Rhodes, G. W. Selleck, W. J. Shupe, and Mr. and Mrs. George P. Trites. The remaining window was donated by W. J. Shupe, E. H. Bethwell, C. W. Parker, D. W. Banker and Rev. Geo. P. Trites building committee.

The building is provided with a full basement amply lighted by the windows on either side, and provided with entrances at both front and rear. A partition at the north end provides for a large kitchen, which is provided with a range, hot and cold water and a complete set of dishes. The building is heated with a pipeless hot air furnace. The local Methodist church was organized November 24th, 1913, and for several years has held its services in the Odd Fellows Hall.

Mrs. A. Vogelhoff, and daughter, Miss Marie, departed the first of the week for Wells, Minnesota, where they will visit relatives and old friends until about the first of May. Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Archambeau who have been residents of the Sutherland valley for many years have traded their ranch east of town for property in the city of Portland and will move to that city next week. John Robertson, with whom the trade was made, will move his family to the Archambeau ranch about the first of March.

A public meeting will be called soon with the object of discussing the construction of a one story building suitable for public entertainments, basket ball, dances and other amusements where both young and old can occasionally have a good time. The principal object of the movement is to provide a place for the young men and boys where they can enjoy indoor games every evening.

Mrs. Ellen Avedio died at her home west of town at an early hour last Tuesday morning after an illness of several months, aged 72 years. She has long been a resident of this community and was the mother of Henry Parazo, a well known rancher in the east end of the valley. She leaves a daughter in Washington and a daughter in California. Pending the arrival of her daughters, the time of the funeral has not been announced.
