The membership committee of Sam Evans, Mark Tisdale and C. H. Bailey, will put on a membership campaign during the month of March. The league now has about 500 members, which is to be greatly increased. The dues are one dollar per year. This will raise a sufficient fund to carry on the work in a satisfactory manner.

The next meeting will be on April 6th, at which time the following committees with the duties herein-after set out will be appointed.

Membership.
It is the duty of this committee to secure members for the association.

Legislative.
The duty of this committee is to recommend, investigate and foster by all proper methods, legislation consistent with the object of the association, either by the legislature or through the initiative.

Roads and Bridges.
It is the duty of this committee to supervise all of the activities of the association in connection with road building, bridge building and the expenditures for such purposes. This is a very important committee, and sub-committees will be appointed by this general road and bridge committee to assist in the work.

County Officers Committee.
This committee is expected to look after the expenditures in the various offices in Douglas county. This refers to the Clerk's office, the Assessor's office, the Sheriff's office, the Treasurer's office, the Prosecuting attorney's office. The committee is expected to know how efficiently funds are expended in these offices, whether the work is being done as economically as possible, whether the work is being done as cheaply as similar work in other counties and report to the association each year the necessity of various items in the budget which is made for the support of the various county offices.

Sundry Items Committee.
This committee is charged with the duty of investigating the expenditures and the efficiency of such expenditures for all the purposes of the county excepting those made for roads and bridges or those for the various county offices enumerated above.

School District Committee.
As its name would imply this committee looks after all the expenditures made in connection with our school system throughout the county. This does not refer only to the county school expense but to the expense of each school district in the county.

Municipal Committee.
This committee is charged with

the duty of investigating municipal affairs, necessity of various expenditures, the efficiency of the municipal officers and the consideration of the proposed budgets of the various municipal entities.

Price List Committee.

This is one of the most important committees of all. Its duty is to investigate and report the prices paid by county, school district and city officials for supplies of various kinds. It is also expected that this committee will ascertain prices paid for similar supplies by other counties, and school districts and municipalities.

A committee consisting of L. V. Emery, G. W. Riddle and H. O. Par-geter was appointed to secure an itemized statement of all bills paid by the county each month for the purpose of making an audit.

A new feature of the league is to be an open meeting each month at the close of the director's meeting, whereby any person or district having a grievance against the county may appear and register the complaint. This complaint will then be impartially investigated and if a just one will be taken up through the proper channels. The first open meeting of this kind will be held on April 6th.

B. W. Strong, who has acted as president for the past three years, was at this time extended a vote of thanks for his untiring efforts and splendid work in behalf of the taxpayer's league.

SATISFIED WITH SUN DIALS

Men of a Few Generations Ago Did Not Demand Exactitude in the Matter of Time.

John C. Tomlinson of New York has made a specialty of sun dials, and a writer in the New York Post says in an interview with him:

"People used to be less particular about time, of course, than we have grown to be, with our famous exactitude. The old English stage coach left 'at four,' but that meant 'at about four.' Only noon could be depended upon—and that when the sun chose to shine. Clocks did not come into use in Europe until the Thirteenth century. Portable clocks were not invented until toward the end of the Fifteenth, but sun dials were very commonly worn—not set up in gardens merely, as we are accustomed to seeing them now. They were used quite generally in this country until the early part of the Nineteenth century, and even today, where conditions are primitive, they are the reliance of guides and hunters. Occasionally they become the timepieces of the British army in uninhabited regions.

"Washington was in the habit of carrying a sun dial, although he possessed many watches. The escutcheon of the United States is copied from an escutcheon upon a sun dial in England belonging to one of Washington's ancestors. Thomas Jefferson was a proficient dialist, and Mr. Tomlinson has two dials made by him; one in 1807, when he was President.

The Middle Initial.

Grover Cleveland, William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson (who dropped his first name Thomas, early in the career) got along without middle names or initials. The middle initial, incidentally, is almost exclusively an American characteristic. An Englishman may call himself John James Smith, but practically never John J. Smith. A Frenchman may be baptised Auguste Charles Jesus Marie Georges Dupont, but he will be known to the world as Georges Dupont, and probably will sign himself G. Dupont.

The use of more than one given name is puzzling to a Frenchman. When Senator Lodge is mentioned in the French press, he is never "M. Lodge," but "M. Cabot Lodge," or as one prominent Paris daily writes it, "M. Cabot-Lodge." The President-Elect may look forward to be known on the continent as "President Gamaliel Harding."—Editorial Digest.

Pueblo-Type Cottages Are Cement.

All the quaint charm of the old pueblo style of architecture is preserved in concrete in a series of little cottages now under construction in Monrovia, Cal. The one-story buildings are most remarkable for their complete use of cement, woodwork being practically eliminated. Even the roofs are concrete, and the doors are made of magnesite, according to an illustrated article in the January Popular Mechanics Magazine. The poured walls, five inches thick, inclose a web of waterproofing material, while the cement floors are stained in Spanish-leather effect, waxed and polished. The little structures are wholly fireproof, and easy cleaning is assured by the absence of moldings, casing and baseboards. Inclosed courts off the kitchen and sleeping chambers, partly roofed and partly screened, provide outdoor protection and privacy.

On Selecting Doors.

Haphazard selection of doors of the ready-made variety should not be allowed in the building of a fine home, declares an announcement issued at Chicago by the lumber interests. Doors should be designed by the architect who builds the structure, that they may be in keeping with the general style of the house, it is stated.

It is pointed out that in the selection of an attractive and distinctive doorway depends the visitor's first impression of the home he is about to enter.

Recounting the history of doors, lumber manufacturers point out that in early days wooden doors were hung on sockets instead of hinges. In the middle ages doors were richly carved and in the gothic period were nearly covered with intricate ornamentation extending as part of the structure.
