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# THE MEXICAN MARKET

American manufacturers are now turning an interested eye toward Mexico. Various "tours" by chamber of Commerce organizations and different groups of business men have already been made through Mexico both for the purpose of slating up the opportunities in the southern republic and bettering international business relations. Now the Associated Industries of Massachusetts are planning a trip lasting from March 12 to April 4. A group of manufacturers will visit Mexico City, Tampico, Monterrey and San Luis Potosi. The Mexican consul in Boston will accompany the visitors, and at Laredo, Tex., official interpreters will meet them and escort them throughout their rugged sojourn in Mexico.

The promoters of this industrial jaunt have their purpose as a wish to show Mexico that Massachusetts can furnish her everything from "every known kind of manufactured product from a pin to an electric turbine." In the public announcement of their plan they say:

"Authorities agree that there never were such opportunities for trade between the United States and Mexico as there are today, and that they are constantly increasing. A representative of a concern affiliated with the associated industries of Massachusetts, who spent four years in Mexico, and who has just returned, says there are hundreds of millions of potential contracts in Mexico alone for products of which more than 90 percent of which are manufactured in Massachusetts and other parts of New England."

"The National City Bank of New York says the opportunities for the American trade in Mexico today are greater and more propitious than they have been in many years, if ever before; also that Mexico now is a safe place for Americans to travel and do business, and that the losses incidental with doing business with Mexicans under recent anking arrangements, are no greater than those attending similar business done between concerns in the United States."

All this is news of a very interesting sort. It is not given quite the prominence recently recorded to the jingo complaints exchanged between Mexico and the United States, but it is likely to be of far more importance and worthy of more general credence.

# HONORING THE WAR DEAD.

While the United States is preparing to honor its unknown dead, as France and England have done, by bringing back and burying with elaborate ceremonies one of the "unknown" soldiers now lying in France, it would be just as well to pay a little more honor to the known dead. They are being brought home now, in large numbers, from the temporary French burial place, in response to the request of relatives. In some of the larger cities most every day sees the arrival of two or three. And the homecoming is often tragic in a way quite aside from the natural grief it brings to the families concerned. The government considers that it has done its part in bringing the bodies back. It merely delivers them at the homes of the nearest relatives and leaves them without further provision. The family thereupon is obliged to arrange for the burial. In the present state of unemployment, many a family finds that a hard or even impossible task. The American Legion has done its best, providing usually an escort of honor to accompany the body to the cemetery and take leave of it with due military rites, and in urgent cases paying the expense of interment. But that imposes a hardship on the Legion. It looks as if either the federal government or the state or the city ought to make some adequate arrangement for seeing that these returned heroes, who have so honored their country and who themselves have paid the supreme price, should have their mortal remains treated with fitting respect.

# Pilgrim Pageant Be Grand Affair

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Feb. 24.—The moon and tide have dictated the dates for the pageant to be presented next summer in celebration of the tercentenary of the landing of the pilgrims.

As the scenes are to be set on the shallow shore where the forefathers first trod, presentation of the piece will be subject to the turns of the tide. To obtain the best artistic effects, it has been decided to hold the events at night, making the moon a factor in the program plans. As a result the program was consulted for the most advantageous dates. Prof. G. P. Baker, of Harvard, who is preparing the pageant for the tercentenary commission, announced that the spectacle can best be shown on four consecutive nights in the middle of July, in the first of August and in the middle of August. At those times only it was found, did the moon and the tide which it controls, promise to combine the elements considered essential to the most effective presentation of the pageant.

The pageant is planned as the central feature of the celebration here next summer. It is to be divided in seven episodes, portraying the lives of the fathers in many separate scenes.

The performances are to be given in the immediate vicinity of Plymouth Rock, and that historic boulder may appear as one of the "stage properties." The waters of the bay, on which the Mayflower sailed from the Cape Cod anchorage, where the famous compact was signed, to the spot where the landing was made, will serve as a background and Coles Hill, where many of the pilgrims had lived, died and were buried, will form a natural amphitheatre.

The performers, who will number 1,000 or more, probably will include some of the fore descendants of the pilgrims who live near the scene of their settlement.

# Girl Is Missing; Man Arrested

SALEM, Feb. 23.—With the arrest this morning of O. C. Freed, a laborer, who is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor child, came from District Attorney John Carson the story of the strange disappearance, several days ago, of little Jennie LaFlemme, 15 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles LaFlemme, of Brooks, Ore., who left her home presumably bound for school, and who has not been heard from since. Efforts of her parents and authorities to gain knowledge concerning her whereabouts have as yet been fruitless.

Officials said this afternoon they are convinced that Freed, who has pleaded not guilty, can solve the mystery which surrounds the girl's departure. Friends of the prisoner are at present endeavoring to raise \$400 cash bail which Judge G. E. Unruh has demanded for his release.

Freed, who was arrested this morning by constable Walter DeLong, has been employed as a farm laborer in the vicinity of Brooks and was in that neighborhood when taken into custody. He is said to be married and to have two small children. When arraigned in the justice court this morning he declared he knew nothing concerning the little girl's disappearance.

Freed's preliminary hearing has been set for March 9.

# Howard Hanging Takes Place Friday

Invitations have been sent out for the hanging of George Howard, who is to be executed Friday for the death of George R. Sweeney.

Although Howard at first denounced religion and refused accepting at religion and refused to accept the intentions of the minister, he recently changed, and in a conversation with the warden of the penitentiary a few days ago, said that he was ready to die. The prison chaplain has visited the doomed man almost daily for three weeks. Howard reads almost continuously, and in most instances has demanded the works of the world's best known authors.

As the execution day draws near, Howard's chief concern seems to center upon his aged mother, who resides in Malheur county. The prisoner has mentioned her on various occasions, and a few days ago he let it be known that he would welcome her for a final visit. When fellow prisoners heard of Howard's statement, they took up a collection of \$70 and this money was sent to Mrs. Howard that she might come to Salem to bid her son a last farewell.

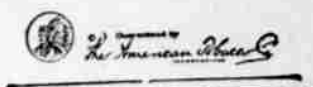

The petitioners estimated the corporation's liabilities at \$2,210,000 and its assets at \$420,000.
