LO, THE RICH INDIAN.

Perhaps it will astonish some persons to learn that the American Indian as a rule is not a citizen of the United States. It is true that the Indians have really the best claim for being among the "first families" in the country. And now the house Indian affairs committee plans to report to congress a bill which would confer citizenship upon most of the Redskins. Citizenship would enable the Indians to use the riches which they own, but cannot now employ at their will. The value of their property is computed at \$1,000,000,000. They are charges of the government and as such their financial interests are carefully guarded by Uncle Sam. Now it is proposed to pass on to them the self-determination principle which seems so generally to have been ignored in other lands. The Indians are far from having been exterminated in America. There are now 333,762 of them in the country, of which 164,783 are full bloods and 46,176 more than half bloods. Some 100,000 speak English and nearly 200,000 wear white men's clothes. Already 70,000 Indians are citizens, and 26,314 are voters. The Indians in 1919 had total incomes of \$53,944,859, which certainly indicates that the poor Indian, has become Lo, the rich Indian. And certainly Lo of all the races that mingle in our land, deserves the wealth if anyone does. For once it all belonged to him.

There will be no dissenting voices at the news that the Finnish government has given the Nobel peace award for last year to the American Red Cross. During the year the Red Cross has carried its work of mercy among more than 20 foreign nations. Its relief work at home has brought it into contact with 164 American communities which suffered from disaster of one sort or another. It has worked continuously in almost every community in America in some helpful capacity. The object of the award, as stated in the original will of Alfred Nobel, was to encourage those who had most efficiently "served the purpose of humanity and promoted the solidarity of nations." Wherever the American Red Cross has worked, there humanity has benefited directly and internationally good will has prospered. The award carries with it the sum of \$40,000. This will go directly to the treasury of the Red Cross to be soon abroad again for the good of human kind. Seldom have cause and reward come together so fittingly.

There is much talk of reducing railroad passenger fares. This talk, oddly enough, comes from some of the same railroad men who recently demanded and obtained the high fares now prevailing. They are not actuated by generosity. They are suggesting reduced fares to increase their income. Receipts from passenger service have not grown as expected, since the rate raises. They have shrunk. The high rates have discouraged travel. It has been proven often in street car service that high fares result in a loss, because they drive people to walking or riding in automobiles instead of patronizing the trolley lines, and now the steam lines are making the same discovery. It is hard to tell just what rate of fare would most promote travel, but there is little question that some measure of reduction would benefit the railroads as well as the public.

Anything that Roseburg can do to encourage the summer tourist to make this city a stop-over point on the way north or south, should be accomplished at once. The tourist travel is a mighty big asset. It is worth going after—going or coming.

Poor congress! The country orders it to save money, and then every time it tries to cut down an appropriation it is deluged with demands to let that alone and save something else.

Give some persons plenty of time and they will tell you a lot more than they know.

How about that new bridge to span the river at Alexander's Park?

DOWN WITH SHORT DRESSES

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 26.—Mother Hubbards for the high school girls. Down with the dimpled knees cap. Abas to the French heel! To the dogs with the décollete waist.

A bill introduced in the house today provides that no teacher or high school pupil shall attend school or a function unless dressed "in non-transparent clothing, covering his or her person from the neck to within twelve inches of the level of the bottom of the heel while standing."

The measure further provides that "the arms from the elbow to and including the hands may remain uncovered." Heels are limited to one and a quarter inches.

The state superintendent of public instruction is given the power to fix the maximum sum of money which shall be expended by the students on clothing.

Building Highway
Through the Sky

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—(United Press)—America's first model aerial highway will be constructed early this year, the U. S. air service declared today.

The airway will connect Washington and Dayton, Ohio, this state, and will be provided with landing fields at 15-minute flight intervals. The fields all will be equipped with radio control stations, light navigation aids, housing and maintenance equipment—accommodation that will make general travel over the route safer, the announcement said, than auto touring by road.

The primary purpose of the airway will be to demonstrate the value of such routes not only for commercial use but for national defense, and to test whether they should be subject to federal interstate legislation rather than state control.

Being without authority to purchase ground for landing fields, the air service is co-operating with local chambers of commerce and private companies to organize the first route, it was said. Nearly a hundred landing fields not part of air service property already are charted.

YOUNGEST FATHER ON RECORD.

DENVER, Feb. 25.—(By United Press)—The youngest father has been found in Denver. He is Otto J. Jehovah, three years old.

When a birth record was filed here recently, the father's age was given as three. Investigation showed the other had three other children and that he was a member of the Jehovahs, a religious cult.

He told authorities that he did not begin to live until three years ago when he joined the sect.

The baby's name is Otto Jehovah.

MYRTLE CREEK HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

The senior class wish to thank the people of Myrtle Creek and the teachers for their patronage at the senior dinner last Saturday. They were very successful, clearing about \$16. This money is to be used in defraying class expenses.

The local zone institute held at Myrtle Creek last Saturday, Feb. 19, was well attended by teachers from neighboring districts, numbering about 35 in all. The program was well carried out, everyone performing their assigned parts quite successfully. Mr. Kellogg spoke briefly on zone athletic contests, his discussion was supplemented in detail by the plan for holding contests in the county in such a manner that all the outlying districts might be represented. All the schools in this district will probably meet at Riddle some time in May, and the winners will meet at Roseburg during the strawberry carnival. Mr. O'Neil of Riddle gave a talk on the resources of Douglas county, and Mr. Dooling spoke of the success achieved by the state course of study. Miss Duppe, the county health nurse, told the teachers how to detect diseases, how to prevent and cure them, and gave a demonstration accompanied by a very interesting presentation of the topic to the pupils. The next institute will be held at Riddle on March 12.

On February 22, the pupils and teachers agreed to celebrate the day by cleaning the school grounds. After singing a number of patriotic songs and listening to an address by Mr. Dooling, they began their work. Some of the boys dug out the five large stumps which have decorated the grounds for years past, some worked at the tennis court, some old wood in the shed, while the girls raked the leaves. Now the grounds show great improvement.

The winners of the essay contest held at the conclusion of the pruning demonstration of two weeks ago are: Joe Rice first, Dell Wood second, and Amy Steltzer third. Mr. Kuykendall presented a very useful prize in the form of an Eversharp pencil, to the winner.

Alva Bowman, one of the freshmen boys, has been out of school the past week because of sickness caused by an infected arm.

Chester Morgan, of Roseburg, was in Myrtle Creek visiting his old class-mates of 1921.

The precocious pupils in the state examinations on the Bible were Dorothy Rice, who stood highest, and Howard Kirby passed in both tests, while Lucille Aldredge was successful in the New Testament.

This is a fair showing of the seven who took part. It would seem, however, that a larger attendance at Sunday school is desirable.

Baseball has started with considerable interest. A few more good days and the lower field will be dry enough to grade. We hope to have a game this year. In addition tennis and handball will be played.
