Machinist Invents
Cement Shingle

M. A. Johnson, local blacksmith, is the inventor of a cement shingle which is attracting a great deal of attention. The inventor claims that the shingle is absolutely waterproof and will last for ages. The cement is cast in a special mold into a square slab the thickness being about three-eighths of an inch. The surface exposed to the weather is treated with a coat of pure cement, which when it is smoothed, makes an absolute waterproof surface. On the under side are a system of projections, and these form tight shoulders against the surrounding shingles when the roofing is put in place. A large projection serves to hold the shingles in place by their own weight, no nails being required, the shingles being so manufactured that few cleats are needed to hold them in position. An interest in the invention has been given to Dennis Matthews in exchange for an interest in his shop, and the two men are preparing to introduce the new shingle on the market. An application has been made for patent, and in the meantime the shingles are being manufactured in large quantities at the local shop.
