The Cow Creek canyon in the southern part of the state, noted for its scenic beauty, is more noted still on account of the number of wild deer that abound in the hills and forests which line the canyon on either side, furnishing great and profitable recreation for the venturesome hunter.

Each season finds these hills filled with marksmen, who are satisfying their recreative desires by tramping over these wooded haunts seeking a deer, whereby they might also satisfy their sporting nature. NEW YORK NEWS LETTER

NEW YORK, March 7.—It has been a long time since any better or more convincing alibi has appeared in court than that a restaurant proprietor offered the other day. His place is known by the stimulating title of "The Pepper Pot," and the police entered it and hailed the afore-said proprietor into court on the charge that it was such a noisy place that it disturbed the neighborhood and could be classed as "disorderly" because of that racket emanating from it. And to behold! Whom did the grievous man bring in to defend his good name but a group of chess players. "The chess players of the neighborhood make my place their headquarters," he averred, and the chess players nodded. "Could anything demonstrate more complete quiet than that?" And the chess players echoed, "Could it?" It could not," agreed the judge, and dismissed the complaint. "But why do you call it the Pepper Pot?" someone asked. "Doesn't that—well, sound sort of—well, peppy, as it were?" "Peppy, me eye!" exclaimed the proprietor. "Pepper Pot is the name of a soup. Where's your education?"

Here is a new profession; and it's said to be a hopeful one. The energetic Mr. Braithwaite, who has spent so much of his life compiling anthologies of poetry, is in the market with a new service. The city weights and measures department has cured most of false-bottom measure crookedness, just as it has tamed the butcher who used to weigh his thumb with your chops."

The Chinese may be peculiar—and again they may be only prudent. Four of them who landed here the other day are certainly not going to take any risks in which they aren't certain of the percentage for or against them. They came from Progress, Mexico, on the liner Monterey, and are enroute home to China with \$150,000, which they saved from their earnings in a Spanish-American restaurant. Yes, a Spanish-American one, owned and conducted by four, whose names are Lo Kwang, Manuel Han, Tan Yunglo, and Lee San. (But this is an age of internationalism). Quite aside from the political agreement or disagreement, he has always been a pleasant—and rather silent—neighbor. But they do think that their town and its famous golf links and its homes and all the rest of it mean considerable by themselves. And so it jarred a group of best citizens the other day who were buying their tickets at the same time to have the ticket seller turn to his assistant, when they had stated their destination clearly, and call out, "Four tickets to Murphy."

Something to Think About

THE JOB AND THE MAN

IN ALL history, sacred and profane, there is no more interesting figure than that of King Solomon. Wise beyond the other rulers of his time, his reputation stretches over from the days of the Old Testament into the records inscribed by the writers of the Christian era and he stands as the type of magnificence and wisdom.

You will find much to interest you in reading the story of Bethsabea, the mother of Solomon. Many a modern "best seller" has filled in that ancient story with modern characters. You will be interested in how Solomon came to be king and what he did after his rule began. You will be interested in the fact that although he was a wise man he had his weaknesses and died at the age of sixty from a worn-out body.

The most interesting event in Solomon's life is recorded in I Kings, third chapter, beginning with the fifth verse. Somewhat condensed it reads as follows:

In Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon . . . and God said, ask what I shall give thee. And Solomon said . . . Thou hast made Thy Servant king instead of David my father, and I am but a little child. I know not how to go out of come in. Give therefore Thy servant an understanding heart to judge Thy people, that I may discern between good and bad, for who is able to judge this Thy so great a people? . . . And God said unto him, because thou hast asked this thing, and hast not asked for thyself long life, neither hast asked riches for thyself, nor hast asked the life of thine enemies; . . . Behold I have done according to thy words; lo, I have given thee a wise and understanding heart . . . and I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches and honor, so that there shall not be any . . . like unto thee.

The great trouble with the most of us is that we lack an understanding heart. Parents do not have an understanding heart in the consideration of their children and children lack it regarding their parents.

If our public officials could have an understanding heart when they consider the problems of the people how much more wisely they would govern. If the heads of nations could have understanding hearts how completely the faculty would take the places of armies and battlefields, bloodshed and destruction, in the solution of the world's problems.

We should all cultivate a viewpoint outside ourselves.

Selfishness, envy and covetousness are responsible for more evil than all the other human characteristics.

The golden rule has in all ages been the basis of religion. Confucius wrote it down before the Christian era began. Mohammed made it a part of his creed, and as far back as there is a trace of any code for human conduct "to unto others as you would be done by" has been a foundation stone.

It is the understanding heart that establishes the basis for that reciprocity of action. It is the understanding heart that tells us when we have put our neighbor on an equality with ourselves and made due allowance for whatever difference there may be in wealth, in position, in intelligence and in opportunity.

We pray for a good many things we do not need. We seek for what we think would be blessings, not knowing that we are better off without them. How few of us have and how many fewer of us seek to have, that broad view of life, that generous attitude of mind, that charity of vision and liberality of thought which constitute the thing which Solomon asked above all other things and which choice received so thorough commendation.

It is a short prayer, easily learned and quickly said: "Give me, O Lord, an understanding heart."
