EUGENE, Oregon, March 16.—George Robinson accidentally shot himself in the foot with a shotgun about 10:30 this morning while out hunting on his farm on the river road, a few miles from Eugene. He was rushed to town where physicians amputated his foot this afternoon.

Mr. Robinson was hunting at the time when he tripped and fell over a limb in some brush. In the fall he accidentally pulled the trigger of the shotgun he was carrying, and the charge took effect in his foot just below the ankle.

Friends and relatives rushed him to the Eugene hospital where it was found that his foot was so badly mangled from the shot that it was necessary to amputate it at the ankle this afternoon.

### Back to the Farm Movement Growing

CORVALLIS, March 16, (Special).—Four hundred men are now in training under the direction of the federal board in this district, which comprises all of western Oregon to the south of Salem and Klamath and Lake counties, of southeastern Oregon, according to Oscar W. James, local supervisor and O. A. C. graduate of 1915.

"The back to the farm movement" is said to be in full swing for more rehabilitation students are taking agriculture than all of the courses put together. The men registered in agriculture number 215. All of the agriculture students of the entire state of Oregon and the six southwestern counties of Washington are handled by this office. This is an increase of 50 men over the figures of last quarter. This number taking "ag" is brought about, it is said, by the necessity of keeping so many men in the open air, especially the gas cases.

Of 400 men in training, some are not now in college, but are being trained while at work in such positions as mechanics, farmers and as bookkeepers. Engineering has 95 rehabilitation men registered in some phase while a like number are signed up for commerce and professional courses.

Oregon Agricultural college has approximately 350 of the men now in training, and the remainder are all scattered out among the University of Oregon and other institutions of the state. Practically all men now registered at the college, are, it is in training at the college.
