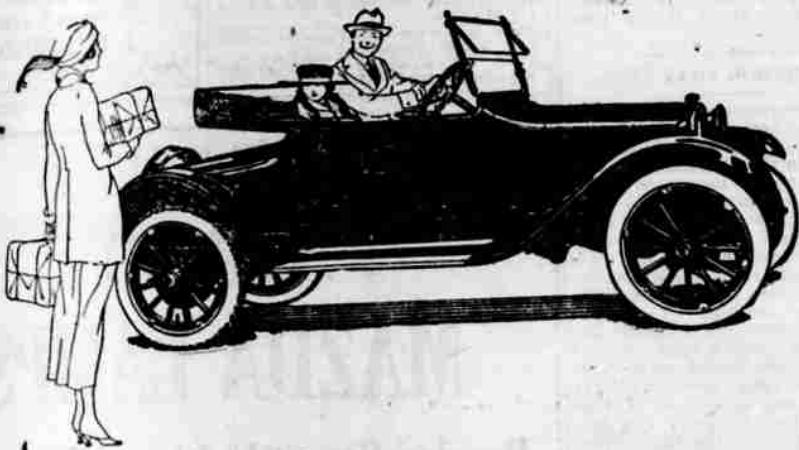

ROTARY CLUBS TO GET FACTS ABOUT LEGION.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 22.—(United Press.)—The Board of Directors of the International Association of Rotary Clubs has ordered a nation-wide survey of conditions surrounding the care of disabled veterans, "to prove whether American Legion reports are based on hysteria or upon actual facts," according to a letter received at Legion Headquarters today from Chesley H. Perry, Chicago, secretary-general of the Rotary organization.

Perry said the Rotary Board had endorsed the Legion's consolidation program for relief to the disabled and would support the Legion's efforts to obtain its enactment into law. His letter said in part: "The 50,000 American business and professional men who form the 800 Rotary Clubs of the United States, have started out to gather the actual facts in their respective communities with regard to the manner in which the United States Government is handling the cases of disabled ex-soldiers. The rotarians have been shocked by the disclosure made by the American Legion regarding the circumstances surrounding the rehabilitation of Uncle Sam's disabled ex-service men. Each Rotary Club is appointing a special committee to investigate conditions in its community and report to the club. Every club will then report to the headquarters office of Rotary in Chicago. The result will be that from 800 communities in every part of the United States will come evidence of business and professional men to prove to the American people whether or not the American Legion reports are based on hysteria or upon actual facts."

MARRIAGE NO LONGER A GAME OF LOVE.

HOUSTON, Tex., March 19.—(By United Press.)—Marriage is a business now—not a love game.

That's the observation of Don Kennedy, marriage license clerk, in Houston.

"Girls around 20 know a boy of 21 can't support them," said Kennedy. "So they're looking about for older men—men who have established themselves and who can provide homes and luxuries."

Ages of contracting couples have changed in the last year or so according to Kennedy.

"Girls of 18 or 19 years used to marry boys of about that age—or 24 maybe," he said. "Now the women are picking older men."

His license record for the last two months showed the women average at marriage 21 years, while the men average 36 years.

And there aren't any blushing brides or stammering bridegrooms any more, according to Kennedy. "Now they breeze in as if they were ordering coffee and order a license without batting an eye," the clerk said.

Parties consulted by us said that it would be necessary for us to go out on the Elktion road to a point within 3 or 4 miles of the Stat bridge and walk from there over the mountains, as the road was impassable. But Ellis Miller stripped his car of all superfluous weight and leaving Mr. Goff's car, we fared forth to try and cross to Elktion. Before reaching the foot of the mountain, we passed a light truck, which had found the going too hard and been left by the road.

In our little car we moved right on. And, say, Ellis Miller can drive balanced on the ridges between the runs like a tight rope performer; mud deep times plowing through mud deep enough to cover the running boards. The little car looked like some amphibious creature emerging from the mud and water. Say, I finally said, what kind of a car is this? Well, said Fred Goff, it's a cross between a Ford and a Delco Light plant and

It sure can go. Yes, I said and from the way it goes through mud and water, I am going to, officially christen it "The Crawfish". And so we carried the Farm Bureau message to that beautiful farming country and that fine class of farmers and their families found on the lower Umpqua. We had fine audiences at Elktion and at Long Prairie and "The Crawfish" piloted by that Prince of drivers, Ellis Miller, brought us safely back over that sea of mud to where we took Fred's car for Drain. I hope he long remains actively in charge of farm bureau matters. He is a tireless worker and above all he has the right idea of the farm bureau as a farmers organization.

Convicted by the Bible.

Cotton Stalks Will Furnish Paper.

The possibilities of cotton stalks as a source of paper have long been suspected and experiments in this direction have been made, but for one reason or another it has never proved quite practical.

The nearest approach to success has been made recently, and it is announced that there is a plant at Greenwood, Mass., where 50 tons of paper are made every day from three times that amount of stalk.

Certain thin tubular fiber in the plant will make excellent cellulose for durable papers. It is strong and flexible. If a quarter of the annual supply of the cotton stalks of the South were put to this use each year there would be no need of a paper shortage in this country.

Reservation for Aborigines.

The commonwealth of Australia has taken steps for the preservation of the aborigines of that country and has assigned a tract of public lands in the northern territories as reservation for the tribes. It includes the Mann and Peterson ranges and practically the whole of Lake Amadeus. The governments of South and Western Australia have set aside adjoining areas for the purpose of this reservation.
