PRUNES WILL GO TO CHINA

Prunes may be shipped to China for the relief of the starving population of that country, according to a letter received by Guy Cordon chairman of the Legion executive committee, yesterday from J. J. Handaker, chairman of the state campaign. This letter is addressed to county and district chairmen and in part follows:

"We are able at last to accept prunes for Chinese relief. Thanks to a most generous offer made by the Oregon Growers Co-operative association by R. C. Paulus, sales manager, and H. S. Gile and company, we are able to accept prunes in any quantity at any of their packing houses. This offer applies not only to members of the packing associations, but to any grower who wishes to give his surplus prunes for the relief of the greatest suffering in the world. This arrangement has just been completed and it may be that the local managers in your neighborhood will not receive word from their companies within the next day or two but instructions, however, will be sent very shortly from Salem to managers. You can let it be known that prunes are acceptable.

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Prehistoric Bones to Be Unearthed

CORVALLIS, April 1.—Part of an elephant which lies buried fourteen miles south of Corvallis will be exhumed April 15 by the Oregon history classes of the college under the direction of Professor J. B. Horner, together with representatives of other schools, and any other persons interested. The classes will also visit the prehistoric burial mounds near Tangent April 23.

Professor Horner's exploration expeditions are popular events of the school years. The elephant bones already exhumed were buried three feet beneath the surface, and hence it is believed by Professor Horner that a large party equipped with shovels will be able to complete the work, take photographs, enjoy a lunch, and return to the college athletic games in the afternoon.

A year ago Mrs. Henry Shannon, a landlady, was displeased with the flavor of the drinking water. She employed a laborer who dug up the bones of the elephant's head. The purpose of the research party is to bring to light the remainder of the great beast.
