CHILDREN'S SOCIETIES.

In the old days children were supposed to be seen and not heard. American life with its easy ways and too great freedom from restraint, soon set them loose from this period of repression. Then came a time when the buoyant and bubbling activity of the kid element promoted organized campaigns of mischief. Social workers for many years studied plans to take this enthusiasm of youth and direct it into useful channels. The Knights of King Arthur were a typical society that influenced many boys, by suggesting noble characters of old as subjects for emulation. Scores of similar organizations have attempted the same end with varying degrees of success. The Boy Scouts seem to have been more successful than any other society of its type in appealing to boy spirit. Girl Scouts and similar organizations have transferred the lives of many young girls. These movements won out by emphasizing real things, instead of merely stirring up play spirit.

Boys and girls like to feel that they are doing things the older people do. When the boys study the drill of the soldier, and the girls cook over the camp fire they feel older than they really are, and become readier to take up the responsibilities of life.

Boys and girls who hang around the streets in an aimless way will grow up into men and women who do not feel responsible for community movements. Those who at an early age attach themselves to some organization with useful aims, have formed the habit of co-operation that is the basis of all community progress. People who want to push their home town a head, should help on these boy and girl organizations, which are training forces that later will accomplish wonders for community progress.

The war put a stop to it for a time, but it is beginning again now and such places as Paris are swarming with wealthy Americans, and many who are not wealthy. Our experience has led us to believe that \$250,000,000 a year will buy a whole lot of things worth more than burning around the decayed and bankrupt kingdoms of Europe. It goes for education and learning, that is different, but the rich saphoids who spend millions of wealth which industrious American hands and brains have created, in senseless dissipation and ridiculous efforts to climb into European nobility, do an injury to themselves and their country.
