TAXPAYERS LOOK INTO COUNTY BILLS

Board of Directors Meet and Consider Work Being Done Throughout the County.

COMMITTEES FORMED

Departments are Formed in Order That Work of Investigating Various Matters to be Considered May be Hastened.

The board of directors of the Taxpayer's league met yesterday at the Douglas Abstract offices in regular monthly session. The directors, all of whom were present, are Loyal V. Emery, Umpqua; C. O. Garrett, of Glendale; G. W. Riddle, Riddle, A. A. Thiel, Sutherlin; C. C. Beckley, Dixonville; C. H. Bartley, South Deer Creek; S. D. Evans, Roseburg and Arthur Marsh, Looking Glass. The League has determined to make a monthly inspection of the county bills, not with the intention of criticizing but to make investigations on certain lines, to lower, if possible, the cost of county government. To assist in this work, it was decided to appoint a number of committees and the following will be formed. Membership, Legislative, Roads and Bridges, County Offices, Sundry Items, School District, Municipal and Price List committees, the members of which will be announced following a meeting Saturday.

An investigation was made of the prices of road materials and it was learned that the price of lumber ranges between \$12.50 and \$20.00 per thousand. As the higher rates in hauling charges where the place of delivery is far from the mill, it was found that this charge was not excessive.

Roadmaster Frear was present at the meeting and gave some interesting information regarding road work. He was asked many questions and the directors were very interested in learning about the plans for future work.

A complaint was made regarding one of the county's road employees who is accused of "killing time" at the county's expense. This matter was referred to a committee and a report will be made at the next meeting. The directors will meet monthly in the future and consider such matters as come under the jurisdiction of the League.
