Greater Liberty For Women Given By Japanese Diet

TOKIO. (By Mail.)--With the gradual adoption in Japan of western ideas, Japanese women are gradually coming to take greater part in affairs. The passage by the house of representatives last week of a bill allowing them to attend political meetings is a significant indication.

In accordance with the general spirit of the Orient, which insists that woman must not be allowed to exercise any function outside of the restricted sphere of the home, Japanese law has heretofore forbidden even the presence of women at political gatherings. Now they are to be allowed the doubtful pleasure of listening to the political spilling, and while this may not seem much, it is a first step towards greater privileges.

The committee of the Diet which reported favoring the bill, said that "the education of women in this country has now reached a stage which completely justifies the recog-
