**Birds Outdistanced
By Army Airplane**

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—A race between an airplane and three carrier pigeons from Portland, Oregon, to the San Francisco bay region, resulted in a striking victory for the airplane. It having beat the leading bird over the 722-mile course by 21 hours and 19 minutes, it developed today.

The airplane, carrying Governor Ben Olcott of Oregon, and Major H. H. Arnold, army aviator, took off from Portland at 8:15 a. m. and arrived in San Francisco at 2:30 p. m. Monday. As the airplane was delayed for an hour at Medford, the elapsed time for the flight was 5 hours and 35 minutes. The first pigeon, a navy bird, called "U. S. S. California," was released at 8:05 a. m. and reached its cote in Oakland at 10:59 a. m. Tuesday, coming in just 21 hours, 19 minutes behind the machine.

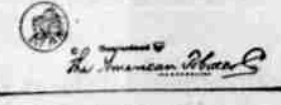
**Advertising Contest

The improvement of 77 additional miles of state highway will be contracted for by the state highway commission at a special meeting to be held in Portland on April 22, according to notices being sent to contractors by the department. These improvements which are estimated to cost approximately \$920,000, are divided into ten different projects. The surfacing of 9.5 miles of the highway with crushed gravel on the Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section is one of the important projects.

**Former Resident
Now In Siberia**

L. Abrahams of this city, has just received a letter from Vaudran C. J. Kinney, for many years a resident of this city, who is now in Siberia with the American forces. The letter which is dated from Vladivostok, March 19, 1921, is as follows:

"Dear Friend:
I have not written a letter since leaving the old town of Roseburg and I often wonder how the town is getting along and if she has changed very much since I moved away from there. I am in Siberia with the U. S. Expeditionary forces. I have been here for about a month. Since leaving Roseburg, I joined the Naval service of the United States, and have seen some of the far eastern countries. I have been all over China, Japan and the Philippine Islands. I left San Francisco, Cal., May 15, 1919, for this country and have been out here ever since. This country is fine, but is very cold right now. The harbor is frozen up and everything is covered with snow. The Japanese are causing a lot of trouble for us and the people. They killed an engineer of the U. S. Albany about two months ago. We relieved this ship from duty and we expect to be here about six months or maybe a year. I hope everybody is well, and also Fay and Bernice. I hope this letter finds you in the best of health, and the best wishes of the season. Please excuse this writing, as I am in a hurry to get this letter off on the boat.
