## HUMANE WORK.

The majority of people are oblivious to the condition of domestic animals. A man could drive a bony and ill fed and limping horse down the street, and most people would not notice anything wrong. On account of this general popular neglect the humane societies do well in asking people to notice April 17 as Humane Sunday. Public schools, Sunday schools, and other children's organizations should draw attention to the subject. Popular carelessness on this matter is illustrated by the way four or five heavy people used to pile into an old-fashioned "carriole" and drive many miles over hard roads behind a single tired horse. They would do the same thing today if automobiles were not more popular. Old Dobbin would occasionally stop for breath on these trips, and then thoughtless people would give him a stinging touch of the whip, or "the bridle" as they humorously called it. But the over-driven beast saw nothing funny about it. With a despairing switch of his tail, he would pick up his toilsome load again, and plod nearly exhausted for many more miles, while the sweat gathered in furrows on his heated coat. And the jolly crowd behind regarded it as a pleasure excursion.

Many people who take the greatest pains to have comfortable clothes for themselves, have always thoughtlessly left horses tied out in the hot sun, or exposed to winter winds without any blanket.

Then there are the stingy horse owners, who stifle their patient old beast on the food that he needs, while he grows thinner and lankier. Before long they have to put their hands in their parsimonious pockets and buy a new horse.

Abuse of domestic animals is often more thoughtless. A few public reminders now and then will lead people to show more humane feeling. The sympathy of children is easily aroused for speechless creatures, and no boy or girl should leave school until he has been well instructed on these points.

Too many vague ideas about community progress, too little definite information as to practical things that could be done, is one reason why so many towns fail to make a good growth. The Fresno, California, business men have avoided this error by organizing parties to visit other cities and learn from personal observation what methods are practiced in fruit raising and other industries, also getting ideas about municipal progress. As many as 200 citizens have been out on this kind of trip, getting a lot of information that they could use to push their own city. It would be a fine thing if the business men of Roseburg would arrange for occasional trips to communities somewhat of our own type, to observe their schools, factories, streets, public works, etc. To keep up with the game of modern progress, you have to know what the other fellow is doing.

While other big cities were growing 10 to 20 per cent from 1910 to 1920, Detroit gained 114 per cent. City boosters in places big and little are asking how on earth they did it. This growth was due largely to the expansion of the automobile business. But the automobile people could not have settled there had not conditions been especially favorable. People familiar with Detroit say these gains were made by the devotion of the business men to their commercial organizations, and their willingness to take hold and work for good local government. The business men of Roseburg have shown very much of this spirit and in so far as we can create a reputation for efficient local administration and business hustle, our community might make gains comparing favorably in proportion to population, with those of the fastest growing cities.

## Berries Best Crop For Logged-off Land

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—Development of the logged-off lands of Oregon and Washington, comprising millions of acres, depends on finding a crop profitable enough to pay for clearing the land. Those interested in the berry and fruit industry declare that berries and small fruits offer the best paying crop for making possible the development of these lands.

"Settlers will find that with the recent high cost of clearing land, berries and poultry offer the quickest possible returns," says W. H. Paulhamus, president of the Puyallup & Sumner Fruit Growers' Canning company, which has just been taken into the big merger, the Oregon-Washington Canning & Preserving Company.

"Settlers can clear a small tract and plant it to strawberries and within a year have a crop that will produce a high revenue. In the past two years growers have made from \$1000 to as high as \$2000 an acre a year. Red raspberries at 18 cents a pound will pay for the land in a year. Red raspberries, even at six or eight cents a pound, will pay from \$200 to \$500 after all expense.

"Western Washington and western Oregon are made up of logged off lands and when the timber is cut of the most intensive farming will be necessary to justify the cost of clearing these lands. We have 3,000,000 acres of such lands and two or three acres is enough to support a family in comfort. Just think what development of the fruit industry to what it should be will mean to these two states. Hundreds of thousands of additional families will be cultivating these logged off lands.

"And there will be a market for our product. If every acre were being used and all were devoting their product to jams alone there would not even then be enough to supply the demand from the state of New York. And we can get our market by a well established marketing system, handling the product under our own labels and maintaining our high quality of product."

## SPORTS CHATTER

In defeating Portland's Beavers, the San Francisco team set a new coast league record for an opening season series, in that the Seals won every game of the opening seasons. Other teams have won seven straight games, but this is the first time on record in the Coast league that one team made a clean sweep in an opening series.

Several important national swimming championships are slated to be held within the next two weeks in this coast. The national diving title was decided last Saturday at the Multnomah Athletic club last week. With Clarence Pingston, of Olympic club declared the winner. Next week at the Olympic club, on Wednesday, the 440 yard national breast stroke will be swum and a week later the 150 yard back stroke will be decided at the Los Angeles Athletic Club. Mr. Norman Ross, the world champion all-around swimmer, and Arthur Skelton, the new star of the breast stroke will compete at San Francisco and Los Angeles.

A young chap named "Dink" Kister, playing in the bushes last Sunday, a fine "fanning" session was put on when he retired twenty-three players of the Arbuckle, Cal. team. The young pitcher is endeavoring to land a berth in the north-western league, and if he keeps up his present pitching work he will be sure to attract attention of the leagues other than the one he is aiming at.

The annual relay carnival of the University of Washington will be held this year at Seattle, April 21, 22 and 23. This athletic event is fast taking the place among the important college relay events of the country, and on the Pacific coast, at the least, stands out pre-eminently as the largest and best of its kind in this far west. It is expected that more than one hundred athletes from all parts of the coast will invade Seattle for the events and this number swelled by the Washington varsity entries will give a very respectable list of entries.

"Ten second" school boy runner are cropping up all over the place. The latest is a lad named Landis, of LaVerne, (So. Cal.) high school who was given even time for the hundred last week. Another good performance at this scholastic meet was registered in the pole vault when young Bennett, of Santa Paula scaled 11 feet six inches.

Somewhat of a swimming phenom has just been unearthed in Los Angeles by Fred Cady, coach of the Los Angeles club. The youngster is not yet fifteen years of age, but already has swum the 50 yards in 25 seconds, and the 100 yards in 55 seconds. This is truly a remarkable performance for a lad of his years.

New Fuel Gas. A Swiss engineer has produced a rich new gas, suitable for use in internal-combustion engines, by first packing sheet-metal drums with alternate layers of common calcium carbide and sawdust, saturated by crude oil, then adding water. The carbide in combining with the water liberates acetylene gas and also generates a high degree of heat which cracks and volatilizes the crude oil, liberating its gases. The two gases then combine to form the new one.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

## SMALL GIRL STAYED PANIC

Her insistence That Pet Parrot Should Be Saved Gave Fellow Passengers Time to Reason.

Kitty Barrett, eight years old, shared heroic honors with a pet parrot in a tale of fire at sea told by passengers landing from the steamship Carthago at Havana, Cuba.

The little golden-haired girl, who is a daughter of Edward Ware Barrett, a newspaper publisher of Birmingham, Ala., refused to enter a lifeboat until she had brought her parrot from her stateroom, and her insistent demand that the bird be rescued calmed some thing approaching a panic among the passengers and gave the ship's crew a chance to extinguish the flames and save the steamer.

While steaming along the coast of Panama one night, the Carthago was set on fire by an overheated motor. The blaze seemed to threaten the safety of those on board, and an alarm was sounded. The passengers gathered on deck and were ready to enter the boats, when Miss Kitty discovered she had left her parrot behind in her stateroom.

She refused to enter the boat until Capt. George A. McBride sent for the bird. Frightened men and women paused to laugh at the calmness of the child and her concern over the safety of her pet, and when the steward brought the parrot to the deck, he also announced the fire had been brought under control by the chief engineer.

## CAMERA SHOWS UP DEFECTS

Why It Is Generally Necessary That Photographs of the Human Face Be Retouched.

Why does a photographer have to retouch his negatives before his customer is satisfied with the picture? The eye of the camera sees things differently from the human eye, although there are some lenses that so diffuse the image that the harsh detail is eliminated. These are the so-called "soft-focus" lenses, and photographs made with them generally need no extensive retouching.

It is the difference in "seeing color" between the lens and the eye that is largely responsible for retouching. The ruddy complexion, so suggestive of good health, under the relentless eye of the camera may turn into dark blotches, for red photographs dark.

The penetrating blue-violet rays are those chiefly used in photography, and these rays furnish the delicate "modeling" of form. The surface of the skin reflects these rays into the camera, and all the irregularities of the skin, such as wrinkles, become more noticeable than when looked at with the human eye, which sees mostly by the red and orange. Instead of the blue-violet rays caught by the eye of the camera.—Popular Science Monthly.

## Big Irrigation Project.

In the state of Washington there is under way a gigantic irrigation project which is unprecedented. It is designed to serve 1,733,000 acres with 20,000 second-feet of water at an outlay of \$30,000,000. That is what has been done by the Columbia basin survey commission with a state appropriation of \$100,000. In fact, the project is unprecedented as a whole as also are some of its elements compared with irrigation works heretofore executed, while in point of cost and general magnitude it is second to but few public work projects either carried out or planned. The daily capacity of the main canal and other trunk-line conduits is 1,728,000,000 cubic feet, or 122,750,000,000 gallons, which is twenty-five times the carrying capacity of the Catskill aqueduct.

## Woman Has Done Good Work.

Miss Gertrude Bell, the compiler of the inner history of Mesopotamia, which has been issued by the British government in the form of a white paper, is regarded as one of the greatest authorities on the East. She has a unusual knowledge of the people, customs, language and political history of Syria, Asia Minor and Arabia, and during the war was attached to the British secret service. At times she vanished for months into the desert, and became known as the "Mystery Woman of the War."

## LAKE IS NATURAL WONDER

Body of Water That Has Many Remarkable Qualities Is Found in North Australia.

Lake Eyre is one of the wonders of the continent. The district is actually below the level of the sea, yet in the near neighborhood of the lake are some fine springs of water that may be considered fresh in that cattle will drink from them. So, too, can drovers, though the water has a medicinal effect which prejudices them in their appraisal of its value.

In the center of the lake is an island of rare beauty. A legend is that, many years ago, perhaps when the first driving party (Doctor Black's) took cattle through to the Northern territory, one of the more daring of the party of white men, unbending the warning of the blacks an "ol' man dehl-dehl" lived in the lake, and fed on men who ventured into the water, undertook to get to the island. He started away on horseback, but did not return. The blacks, who have mysterious means of communication, gave it out that his horse had made the island, where the animal was seen by some of them long after the cattle party had gone. That proved the legend as far as they were concerned.

One of the peculiarities of the water of the lake is that it will preserve anything thrown into it. It is exceedingly buoyant. Stones thrown into it do not sink. (It may be stated that some of the stones—the kind that does not sink—would probably float in any kind of water, being pumice of the lightest variety, almost spongy in texture.)—Sydney (Australia) Times.

## PLINY CREDITED WITH YARN

Ancient Roman Said to Have Originated Remarkable Story Concerning Habits of Tiger.

According to Pliny, when a hunter wished to catch tiger cubs he must be provided with a very fleet horse, and have another in reserve. "When the tigress finds her fair empty she darts forth and tracks them by the smell. When she comes up to the hunter he throws one of the whelps to her, with which she returns to her lair. Then she rushes back, and he throws another to her; and this goes on till he reaches his ship."

Equally interesting is the account in the "Physiologists" which explains that "the heart desirer the water brooks" because it had been inhaling the breath of dragons. So having filled its stomach from the brook, it drowns the dragon out of its hole and stays it with its intlers.
