Congregation Surprises Bro. Hilton

Last night at the Christian church at the close of a great service in which the house was packed, Evangelist Silvers called Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Hilton to the platform and in a few well chosen words he told them that the church had broken into his garage, taken his keys, and his old car and disposed of it, and also stated that standing in front of the church was a new Ford car, up to date in equipment, a gift of the members of the congregation. The gift was responded to by the pastor with a speech full of thankfulness of the kindness of the members to the minister.

The service last night was especially a men's service. The men occupied the front seats and the women the rear seats and the gallery. The choir left had every seat taken with men, and the sermon was directed to men. There was one more response at the invitation. There have been 25 responses now since the meeting began, and about 80 before the coming of the evangelist, which makes a great ingathering for this congregation.

The musical program last night was a fine one. Raymond Brown, a little boy, sang, "I Am a Soldier." Mr. Olson gave an organ solo, the children's choir gave a splendid number, the mixed quartette sang, as also did a male quartette, and the fine program of music closed with a duet by Evangelist Curtis and Charles Stanton. There was hardly a vacant seat to be found in the house, and the interest throughout was the finest. Tomorrow closes the revival. The evangelist speaks in the morning on "Keep the Home Fires Burning," and the converts will be seated in the body. In the evening there will be an illustrated, chart sermon on "Where Will You Spend Eternity?" There will be a fine musical program throughout the day, but a special musical program in the evening. The closing service tomorrow night will witness that scene. The evangelist will leave early Monday morning for his other fields.

BONES REVEAL MASSACRE.

Mute evidence of a long-forgotten tragedy, enacted probably in days of early settlement of The Dalles, were brought to light today when workmen engaged in the construction of the Columbia highway near the Deschutes river, unearthed six skeletons, each with the top of the skull crushed in.

With the skeletons were found an old-fashioned gold watch chain, a rotted McCall's army saddle, some as was used by caissonmen stationed at old Fort Dalles, and a small copper campaign bottle, used by soldiers when cooking in the field.

The bones crumbled to dust upon being handled.

Flowers today were of the opinion that the find was the bones of a skirmishing party of soldiers, who had been ambushed and slain by the Indians. It is also generally thought that several of the skeletons found were those of Indians killed in the fight. This theory was enhanced by the finding of a number of stone beads near two of the skeletons.

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Maple Dell Moore Wins Scholarship

Maple Dell Moore, of Wilbur, a Junior in the department of rhetoric in the University of Oregon, has been awarded the Mary Spiller scholarship for the year 1921-22, according to Mrs. Lawrence T. Harris, secretary and treasurer of the Alumnae Association of the university. This scholarship, which was named after Mrs. Mary Spiller, the first woman member of the faculty, provides for board and room at Hendersicks Hall for one year.

Miss Moore is the seventh girl to receive the award. Since 1911, a total of approximately \$11,000 has been given to six girls, two of whom received the scholarship for more than one year. The increase in the cost of living has necessitated the increasing of the amount of the scholarship from \$135 in 1911 to \$272.62 for this year. This fact is held significant, because the board in the halls of residence during that time has been the actual cost.

From 1911-13, the scholarship was held by Ethelwyn Boydell of Nyssa; in 1913 for half a year, by Bernice Thum of Astoria; from 1914 to 1915 by Helen Withycombe of Yamhill; in 1915-16 by Lois Green of Myrtle Point and in 1916-17 by Helen May of The Dalles and this year it is held by LaVerne Rumbaugh, a Portland girl. Any girl graduate of an accredited high school may apply for this scholarship.

The Alumnae Association of the university, which gives the scholarship, is an organization to which every woman graduate is eligible.
