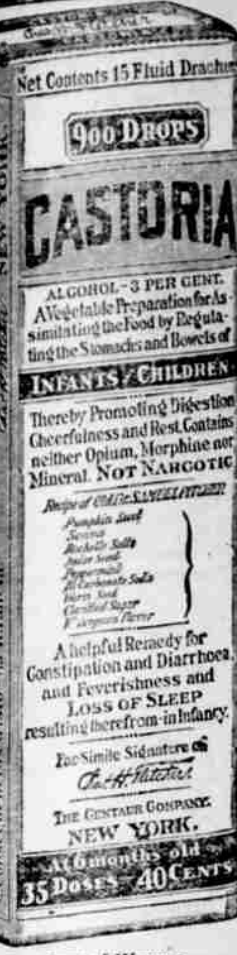

Plan to Restore Liberty Bonds to Par

NEW YORK, April 16.—A plan to restore Liberty bonds and Victory notes to their par value has been drafted by Colonel M. W. Thompson, governor of the war credits board at Washington, and embodied in a bill which is to be submitted to congress. The plan, which was made public by Colonel Thompson in a statement on Sunday, calls for the issuing of a series of consolidated bonds by the government sufficient to take care of the \$29,000,000.00 worth of Liberty and Victory notes now outstanding at par and the transfer of Liberty and Victory notes for consolidated bonds at their par value.

The consolidated bonds would bear a sliding scale of interest, fixed semi-annually by the treasury in advance at the rate per cent that in the opinion of the federal reserve board represents the then market earning power of money invested without hazard.

Colonel Thompson, who is also senior member of the firm of Thompson & Worley, financial accountants and engineers of this city, believes that under this arrangement consolidated bonds would always remain at par and restore the waning confidence of the general public in government securities.

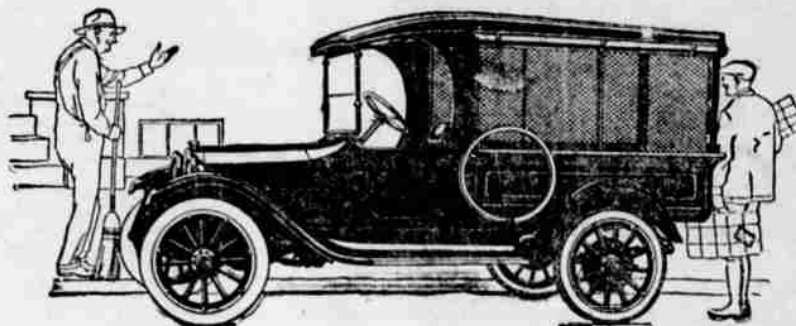
