

CARNIVAL PLANS ARE UP IN AIR

Various Factions Fail to Unite
On Plans For Proposed
Festival.

MUCH OPPOSITION

Schools Fail to Give Support While
City Government is Opposed to
Concessions—Time is Short
to Make Arrangements

The outlook for a Strawberry Carnival in Roseburg during the month of May is not very favorable. Lack of harmony among the various organizations which must co-operate to put over a successful celebration is the cause of the failure to arrange the necessary plans and with only a month in which to formulate the details there is very little time left in which to get together sufficient attractions to warrant putting on the annual festival, unless immediate steps can be taken to unite all factions. By doing this it will be possible by hard work to have a good carnival and one worthy of the attention and support of the people.

In the event that those now disagreeing can be brought together on a good plan the carnival can be successfully arranged, but something must be done within the next week or ten days, or it will be too late to arrange a carnival that will be of sufficient worth to do the city any appreciable amount of good.

One of the greatest problems now facing those interested in putting on a carnival is the apparent lack of support from the schools. There is a great deal of opposition against the schools participating. Many of the parents object to letting their children march in parades, sell buttons, participate in contests, etc. Some of

these arguments advanced apparently good reasons for such opposition and it is a fact that the Portland schools are withdrawing from the festival to be held there. The committee on the other hand holds that the conditions here are not similar to Portland and that the parades are not detrimental to the health of the children and that the carnival will not interfere with school work, and further that a successful carnival can be staged without the schools, for the children's parades are without a doubt the biggest attraction that the carnival offers.

There has been a great deal of opposition to the school contests for juvenile queen, claiming that it promotes hard feelings between schools, classes and children and that the practice of putting out children with caps, buttons, etc., interferes with the school work and keeps the children on the street when they should be at home.

Another problem presented is the attitude of the city government toward any attraction carrying concessions of a chance taking nature.

Mayor Hamilton has announced himself as being strictly opposed to these gaming stands, and in this he doubtless has the support of the city council and in the event that an attempt is made to operate such concessions, there will be difficulty. The people backing the carnival state that it will be impossible to put on the event without attractions and no desirable company will come without its concessions, for that is where it derives its revenue. The financial support for the festival must come from the merchants and many of them state that they will not donate one cent unless a suitable carnival company is brought here. It is claimed that these attractions are necessary to fill in the gaps between the

parades, concerts, etc., for unless the people are given some form of entertainment, they become disgusted and leave, such a feeling injuring the city rather than benefiting it.

The old committee got no farther than setting the dates of May 19, 20 and 21 for the carnival before running aground on the shoals of disagreement and now there is no one ready to assume the lead.

It appears that if the people of the city want to continue the strawberry carnival, that some united action must be taken the first of next week. Some one must assume the leadership, and start a movement to unite the various factions and evolve some plan whereby the carnival may be successfully staged. There is a popular clamor for a carnival. People demand that Roseburg celebrate. But the history of past events shows the minor amount of the financial support to come from the people, and under the present conditions the ones called upon to supply the money for the support of the celebration decline to take any part. Such is the condition existing at the present time and for the good of the city, it is hoped that something can be done at once to promote a more harmonious spirit and bring about a celebration which can truthfully be a united and joyous festival.
