Embalmed Apples Latest In Sutherlin

SUTHERLIN, Or., April 19.—W. E. St. John, the well known local real estate broker and president of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, was exhibiting a "preserved" apple today which is certainly in a class by itself when it comes to lasting qualities. Ten years ago Mr. St. John had several ornamental glass jars of three gallons capacity filled with several varieties of fruit grown in Sutherlin valley and placed in the windows of his office building for display. Some weeks ago it was noticed that the liquid in the jar containing Spitzenberg apples was apparently evaporating, and yesterday it was observed that one apple at the top of the jar was entirely free from contact with the liquid and had turned black. In order to remove its unsightly appearance the jar was unsealed and the apple taken out. It appeared unusually heavy for an ordinary sized apple, and in order to examine it more closely the black skin substance of the exterior was removed, disclosing that the whole interior was solid stone—a petrified apple, even to a portion of the stem. Mr. St. John says he does not recall what formula was used in preserving these fruits, but judging from what happened to this particular apple, he is inclined to believe that the formula was very similar to that now being used by bootleggers in the manufacture of their famous "stonewall" brand.

BOSTON, April 19.—The American marathon, carrying virtually the road racing championship of the country at 25 miles, was won today by Frank Zuna, Newark, N. J., making a new record of two hours, 18 minutes and 57 3-5 seconds.

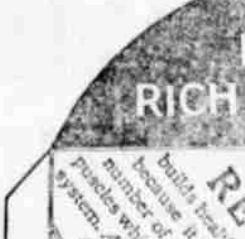
