It was his privilege to visit Romance where is located the American cemetery, containing the graves of 22,000 boys who died in the fighting in the Argonne. Mr. Stewart comes without expense to the local committee and there is no admission charged for the lecture.

A picnic at Eagle Creek is planned for Sunday, May 22.

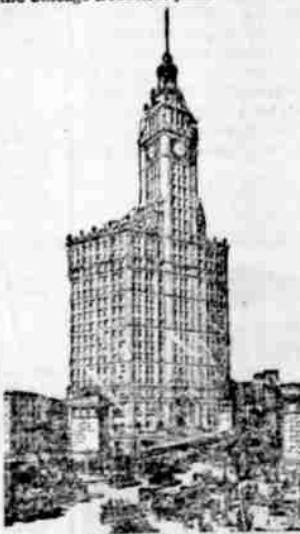

"A JEWEL OF CHICAGO" Is Title Applied to Wrigley Building

Wrigley's new office building in Chicago is at the new Boulevard Link Bridge, Michigan avenue and the river and heads the vista looking north on Michigan avenue, so Mr. Wrigley chose a beautiful design which makes the building a decorative feature of the Chicago lake front and harmonizes with the Chicago Beautiful plan.

The main building is 15 stories high, surmounted by a tower 42 feet square and rising 339 feet from the street level. This tower will contain a clock with dials on four sides, each 20 feet in diameter and will be surmounted by a searchlight lantern 9 feet in diameter. The building is covered with enamel finish terra cotta on all four sides. It is regarded as one of the most beautiful buildings in Chicago and people and press are enthusiastic about it. The Chicago Tribune published a picture labeling it a "Jewel of the Link."

Wrigley also recently completed new factories at Chicago and New York.

MARRIED MEN ARE SAFER THAN SINGLE.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 30.—(United Press).—Single men get into more trouble than married, but married women are more likely to run afoul of the law than single ones, according to the annual report of H. G. Monsen, superintendent of the Milwaukee house of correction.

Also, widowers and divorced husbands and a good chance of looking from behind the bars, while the much maligned divorcee is perfection, as far as law violations are concerned, according to the report.

There were 734 guests of Milwaukee county last year, the report shows, 683 men and 51 women. Of these 500 were single men, 169 married, six widowers and eight divorced men. Of the women 28 were married, 22 single, and one a widow, but not a divorcee.

The report indicates most of those caught in the law's dragnet are between the ages of 20 and 30. The next most dangerous period is between 30 and 40.

DIVORCE A LUXURY—CANT AFFORD IT.

CHICAGO, April 30. (United Press).—The world's "fed up" on H. C. L. stories, but here's one with a pleasant refrain and a beneficial reaction.

Court and attorneys costs are getting so high as to discourage divorce. The condition is becoming a factor in keeping intact American homes.

Under the new schedule which probably will be adopted by Illinois lawyers, the minimum fee for smashing ties of the home is \$135.

Alexander D. King, Jr., chairman of an Illinois Bar Association committee, suggested this charge in questionnaires sent out to members.

Added to the minimum would be the per diem attorney's charge and the court cost. Considering everything one is lucky to get out under \$200 on a divorce proceeding.
