Dempsey Lesson
Learned, Will Not
Rely on Boxing

NEW YORK, April 30.—Jack Dempsey got a notion in his mind some time back that he wanted to become a boxer.

They say that a man always wants to be something else.

Eddie Foy wanted to play Shakespeare. Frank Gotch wanted to be a boxer. Babe Ruth wanted to star at basketball. Dempsey wanted to become a boxer of the Britton class.

Training for that much talked of Brennan fight, the champion, a boxer by trade, worked out with Marty Farrell, a very clever middle-weight boxer, and little Jack Sharkey, a fast moving bantam. Big, lumbering Bill Tate, slow as an ox, was also around in the role of a punching bag.

In the ring against Brennan, the champion tried some of Farrell's boxing tactics and he didn't get an inch with them. He was greatly annoyed by his inability to duck the left that Brennan kept shoving into his mouth.

About the sixth round, Dempsey abandoned the clever tactics and started mauling, a line of endeavor at which he is much more adept.

Training for Carpenter, the champion now says that cleverness is going to be the last object in mind.

He's seeking speed, but does not seem to give the Frenchman a boxing lesson. He's going to stick to his forte and punch.

Getting ready for the European champion over at Summit, N. J., Dempsey said today he was going to surround himself with fast big men who pack a wallop.

His chief sparring partner will be Ed Norfolk, the colored boy who trained Brennan for his last fight with Dempsey and one of the fastest moving heavyweights in the ring.

Norfolk can punch and he can get away from one. Also the colored lad can take one and he's willing to work with the champion for the money and the publicity that he will get out of it.

Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, wants to have about six good, fast heavyweights around the camp to keep the champion busy every day during the six weeks training period they are counting on.

"I'm not going to box Carpenter. I'm going out to punch and keep going after him. It may require a lot of speed," the champion said.
